SPECIAL TOWN BOARD MEETING DRAWS CROWD

The Hennessey Town Board met on Monday, October 2, 2023 to continue the special board meeting started on September 28th. The meeting was attended by a large crowd, and there was much confusion and concern among those present.

The meeting was to discuss the contract for the new Town Administrator Tiffany Tillman. Some individuals questioned the need for a contract, the reasons for Tillman's hiring at the pay rate, and whether an audit could be conducted before finalizing the contract.

Because this was a special meeting the law does not allow for the board to answer questions leaving them with no way to respond. One member of the crowd asked why this was a special meeting in the first place. It was explained by the town attorney that a special meeting is meant to discuss sensitive, sometimes personal employee matters and the contract they were discussing was nothing more than a draft, not an actual contract. Others asked why we needed a contract we had never had one before. Tillman explained that a contract was recommended by the OMMS (Oklahoma Municipal Management Service) the consulting company hired to help the town find a suitable replacement

Several others in the audience shouted out "what about an audit?" This was answered by the attorney who stated that an audit is done annually and certified by the state.

Regarding Tillman's salary, the Town attorney explained that the agreed-upon salary was determined by the pay scale submitted to OMMS, which was approved by all town trustees. The salary was based on job experience in city administration, and Tillman's 17 years of experience qualified her for the position at that particular pay rate.

The attorney emphasized that Tillman was already hired at that salary and the purpose of the special meeting was to discuss her contract, noting that the version circulating on social media was only a draft.

Although the trustees listened to the concerns raised by the public, they deferred to the town attorney for answers, considering state laws and limitations in the Open Records Act. The meeting then moved to an executive session, and upon reconvening, they made no statement. The town attorney later explained that they now have a draft agreement that needs to be worked on and resubmitted to the board for a final look.

Special note; the job position was advertised and promoted by the OMMS consulting firm for 6 months and Tillman was the only one that had applied with all of the qualifications needed for the job. The next regular meeting is scheduled for October 12, 2023, at 6:00 p.m.

HOWDY'S TRAVEL PLAZA SELLS

The home of the world's largest cowboy hat has been sold to Casey's convenience store chain. Jay Riaz, owner of Howdy's confirmed with All About Hennessey on Tuesday, October 3rd that he has entered into a contract to sell the store located on the north end of Hennessey. Riaz said, "We have a lot of work to do but we should done by the end of the year."

Casey's operates 2,500 stores in Midwestern and Southern areas of the United States and is the 3rd largest convenience store chain. The closest Casey's store to us is the one built about 2 years ago at the corner of Hwy 33 and 81 in Kingfisher.

Riaz said, "Part of our contract included transitioning all of our employees to Casey's giving them job security." Howdy's held its initial grand opening in Hennessey on February 25th of this year. Riaz said they just opened the new Duncan store and have started construction on a store in New Castle.


