FORENSIC AUDIT STARTS IN THE TOWN OF HENNESSEY

A forensic audit of the Town of Hennessey began on Tuesday, October 10th. The audit is being conducted by the State Auditor and Inspector's office, upon the request of District Attorney Mike Fields of Enid. During the regular town board meeting, Thursday, October 12th Administrator Tiffany Tillman expressed her satisfaction at seeing them present, as accusations of wrongdoing have been directed at her office.

District Attorney Fields stated that he requested the audit after receiving a report from another state agency, the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation. The preliminary inquiry conducted by the agency raised concerns about possible financial irregularities in the Town of Hennessey. A letter from State Auditor & Inspector Cindy Byrd, dated October 10, was shared with the board, informing them that monthly invoices for the audit cost would be sent to the town to cover the cost of the audit.

Tillman mentioned that the audit will cover records from the past five years, with auditors examining items over three-month periods. When asked about the duration of the audit, Tillman indicated that it could take months, as auditors are currently finalizing work in other towns. The cost of the audit will be paid by the town, although Tillman was unsure of the exact estimate.

Mick Dodson, the general counsel for the Auditor & Inspector's Office, is one of two staff members assigned to the audit. In a previous meeting, Dodson had informed the trustees that the audit could cost the town \$75,000 and would require six months to complete. It is important to note that while the town undergoes a yearly financial audit, the forensic audit specifically focuses on identifying financial misconduct by employees or officers of the organization. This marks Dodson's second trip to Hennessey, following Trustee David Jones reaching out to the auditor's office for assistance in obtaining financial and other records.

Tillman resigned and then was rehired August 29th. David Jones voted against the re-hire and contract of Mrs. Tillman and Harold Shaw left the meeting without voting. Since the rehire, allegations have been flying. During last week's meeting Starla Fuksa, the interim Town Administrator said "I sent all the findings I gathered to the DA" Harold Shaw also said he had contacted the DA as well.

Pavilion Projected Completion Before Thanksgiving!



The John Deutschendorf Memorial Pavilion, a significant project in the "Discover Hennessey" program, has made significant progress towards its completion. Buddy Daniels and his team have successfully established the foundation of the building by constructing the necessary piers. Beginning their work last Monday, the Daniels construction crew drilled 8-foot deep holes to support the structure. The actual building is anticipated to arrive next week and will be painted at Thurmond manufacturing shop. The completion of phase one is expected to be achieved before Thanksgiving, with over 80% of the construction funded by private donations from local businesses. Situated conveniently on West 1st Street, just off Main St., this memorial pavilion is located on the former Lee Lumber site.

Hennessey FFA receives Seaboard and CoBank Grant

Hennessey FFA recently received grants of \$2,500 from Seaboard Farms, and a matching grant from CoBank resulting in a total of \$5,000. Hennessey FFA has had a membership increase of 80 percent within three years to an all-time high of 72 members. With the influx of new, and returning members, the demand for welding/ fabrication experience has increased substantially. But, so has the cost to offer students this experience of zero cost to them. Through student experience in our shop/classroom laboratory, students' skills are demonstrated by their finished shop projects for their personal Supervised Agricultural Experience projects, community members, and the Hennessey School system. These experiences come with high costs, and equipment wear and tear that leads to tool replacement often. Grant funds will be used to buy much-needed tools, and equipment to continue student hands-on learning through welding/fabrication. We want to honor her by spreading awareness!

Breast cancer screening is multi-layered. At your GYN appoint-

ment (we used to call them "yearly appointments" but this is no longer true for some people's intervals/ insurance) your doctor will do a manual exam. This is very important as a first line in screening. You really

should also do your own self exams monthly (and let's be honest-your partner might be better at this than you! *winky face*). Baseline mammogram screening



starts at the age of 40, or 10 years younger than your first degree relative was at the age of diagnosis for genetic types of breast cancer. For example, if your mother was diagnosed with a genetic form of breast cancer at the age of 42, then you should start mammogram screenings at the age of 32. If no risk factors are present, then begin screening at the age of 40, but be sure to keep up with the "handsy exams".

Our mother wants us to be sure and mention how important 3D mammography was for her super early detection! She highly recommends always requesting 3D mammograms! Summer would like to throw in that she had her first mammogram this year and it truly was not as bad as she thought it would be.

After serving their community for nearly 90 years, The Hennessey Lions Club isn't quitting soon even though the group contemplated ending during the dark days of the Covid pandemic. Three-time club president Tim Riddle is proud of the fact that the Lions are determined not to pack it in and wait for better days. Better days arrived too.

Members gathered their patience, and after a six-month shutdown mandated by Lions International, the Hennessey group re-

invigorated their efforts to recapture the excitement of the group. They mounted a recruitment effort which about doubled the size of the organization. The best way to entice new membership applications is to stress participating in the community.

They struck upon several ways to invest their time and funds into improving Hennessey and enriching it. Lions do this by organizing and supporting fundraising events, like developing Mistletoe Magic at Christmas time; offering the Bessie Rutherford Scholarship for a qualified Hennessey senior student; putting up American flags along Main Street on patriotic holidays; doing the Christmas Parade; getting the circus to come to town; hosting the water races of ducks, ping pong balls, or cardboard "boats" at the local 4th of July celebration; and sponsoring the town Easter Egg Hunts. If you think that takes a lot of time and effort and energy, you're right, but that is not the comprehensive list of activities they organize to help Hennessey, grow community spirit, and strengthen ties that all residents develop toward their town. All funds raised by the Hennessey group stay in Hennessey.

Since the organization's inception in 1917, Lions International does have one primary task, and that is a charitable one: to help young people in particular with vision problems. For example, Hennessey Lions pays for eye exams and eyeglasses for needy, qualified schoolchildren. Lions International offers training services to those who are blind, manages a training program for Seeing Eye dogs, supports an eye bank in Oklahoma City, and currently maintains a mobile screening unit that visits communities as needed to help with disease prevention. This giving does not stop with Hennessey as the local chapter contributes funding to local children with medical needs and to worthy school groups. This group is dedicated to its community.

The club meets each Thursday at noon at the Family Café on Hennessey's Main Street. All can visit these luncheons and see the group in action during their meeting time. New members are always welcome and do not have to be business owners or even live in Hennessey, and nowadays, unlike the "olden" days, women may join. Members don't even have to attend each weekly meeting to maintain their affiliation to the organization. Yearly dues are \$75, and those funds go to Lions International.
