HENNESSEY TEEN DIES IN ACCIDENT



15-year-old Hennessey boy died Monday afternoon in a single-vehicle rollover accident southeast of Hennessey.

According to the report issued by the Oklahoma Highway Patrol, the 15-year-old boy was taken to Integris Bass Baptist Health Center in Enid by LifeEMS, where he was pronounced dead. Oklahoma Highway Patrol does not release names of juveniles in its accident reports.

The accident happened at 2:45 p.m. Monday, November 20th on County Road E0640 (Conoco Rd) about three-quarters of a mile east of Mitchell Rd.

According to the report, a 17-year-old boy was driving a 1986 Chevrolet S-10 Blazer east on the gravil County Road E0640 when he lost control due to speed went off the road to the left, and rolled one and a half times, with the vehicle coming to rest on its top.

The driver, also a minor from Hennessey was transported by personal vehicle to St. Mary's Regional Medical Center in Enid. According to the report he was treated and released later that day.

Oklahoma Highway Patrol, Hennessey Police & Fire, Kingfisher County Sheriff, and LifeEMS worked on the incident. No other official information was available at the time of this paper's deadline.

Powder and String Club: Where Community Friendships Begin

In the 1960's, the Lacey community some eight miles west of Hennessey saw a group of men interested in hunting and fishing who met periodically in the old Lacey School building. Once the school closed, the club disbanded until these hunting aficionados decided to regroup in a new place, with additional members, in Hennessey. Thus, the long-standing organization renewed itself in 1968, and soon after, the club became known as the Powder and String Club.

Early members included Darrel Mauck, Bob Lovell, Dale Melendy (still club members today), and the late Harold Bullis among others. The men would bring their sons with them to the meetings, and while the meetings had the men sharing tips on lures for successful fishing and the reloading shells for upcoming hunting seasons, they also brought their children into the fold with instruction regarding hunting, fishing, proper gun handling, and field activities.

The Powder and String Club still meets the second Thursday of each month these many decades later, and its focus continues to be youth education, especially regarding the shooting sports and hunting. They meet at the Maple Grove School west of Hennessey. Currently, the club has nearly 30 men and women interested in the outdoors. Family memberships are typical. Melvin Pospisil serves as president with Delbert Torrey as vice president, and Mike McGee as secretary/treasurer.

At the Maple Grove School site, the club maintains two trap houses, one for nighttime trap shooting. In addition, the club leases a pond exclusively for members to fish. To continue their tradition of bringing young people into the shooting and fishing world, they offer 4H gun safety and trap shooting instruction and legitimate 4H trap shoots. Members Tanner Choate and Mike McGee are both certified 4H coaches.

The club provides upkeep for the school and its grounds as well as support for 4H members interested in shotgun sports, so in order to accomplish that, they host fund raisers. For example, they host fun shoots the first Sundays of each month at \$10 per round of trap. In the spring, they hold a fishing derby. This year, 20 participants came to tempt the fish who weren't biting too well that day, but they enjoyed a fish fry afterwards anyway. The club hopes for more cooperative fish this upcoming spring.

They would like to re-institute their annual Game Feed Banquet which has fallen from the club calendar due to a small and aging membership, a lack of venue, and the Covid epidemic. The Game Feed Banquet served wild game taken by club members and enjoyed by ticket holders. Sometimes, the serving line boasted some exotic meats, such as bear, boar, and turtle. Unfortunately, calf fries never made it to the serving line as the cooks gobbled them up in the kitchen. A guest speaker like perhaps a National Rifle Association



executive or an official from the Oklahoma Wildlife Conservation office might be the evening's speaker.

The Powder and String Club proudly supports the local 4H members and offers solid instruction in hunting and gun handling skills, all vital to the shooting sports and outdoor life. The 4H club actually meets in the Maple Grove School courtesy of the club. Powder and String members have always made connections with its community and calls the club a community-minded friendship organization with a sincere interest in the education of young people who will inherit the use of the outdoors and should be able to respect and utilize it properly.

People are encouraged to join by contacting Mike McGee; individual memberships cost \$25 per year while family memberships are \$50. Keep the outdoors alive and well by participating in Powder and String, help educate young people, and learn to work as a team and enjoy Mother Nature while doing so.

Sharon was preceded in death by her parents, one brother Kenny and one sister in law Carol.


Memorial donations may be made in her name to First Baptist Church with the funeral home serving as custodian of the fund.

Abigail Holsten Abigail is a junior at HHS. She is interested in the field of education. Her mentor is Amanda Luper, the kindergarten teacher at Hennessey Early Childhood Center.

Abigail has been attending HPS since fifth grade. She is currently in FCCLA (Family, Career, and Community Leaders of America). Abigail chose to be in the program to develop leadership skills. 
