



THE FINAL HIGHWAY WELCOME SIGN HAS BEEN INSTALLED!






LAW ENFORCEMENT APPRECIATION DAY JANUARY 9TH

Merry Christmas from Representative Dobrinski

I would sincerely like to wish everyone a very Merry Christmas, and I hope you all enjoy a joyous, peaceful holiday with your loved ones.

Before the end of the year, I wanted to give an update on the implementation of the Terry Peach North Canadian Watershed Restoration Act. This act, put in statute through my House Bill 2239, created a pilot program to explore solutions to the red cedar infestation prevalent in our state.



Since July, I've been working with Trey

Lam, executive director of the Oklahoma Conservation Commission, who is directing efforts through the Conservation County District Offices to eradicate red cedars and other invasive species in the North Canadian watershed. They are using prescribed burns and other methods to create brush-free zones around communities and rural infrastructure. They recently began mechanically removing red cedars near Boiling Springs State Park near Woodward and have made quite a bit of progress.

The documentation of their efforts gives them a framework of research to expand the program across the state. The Legislature appropriated almost \$3.3 million to start this program, which I'm confident will pay huge dividends for us as it reduces wildfires and conserves precious water. Lam said the current negative economic impact from cedars is \$500 million.

Another topic of great interest in our district is securing broadband Internet access for people lacking high-speed service. The Broadband Governing Board is expected to award its first grants to providers in January. This first series of grants will be funded from the \$374 million in American Rescue Plan Act funding that was allocated to the Oklahoma Broadband Office by our House and Senate Joint Committee on Pandemic Relief Funding.

The executive director of the office, our former state Rep. Mike Sanders, said they have received 300 funding proposals totaling \$5 billion. I know it's a herculean effort to cull those requests down to distribute available funding, but I'm hopeful for results that will reach a number of Oklahoma communities, including in our area. The board will be distributing additional funding from other programs in the future. A number of private companies also are working on installing broadband service throughout the state, but that is not funded with state dollars.

On a separate note, it's been very disappointing to me that state Superintendent Ryan Walters has been in the news so much lately for what appears to be a failure to communicate or share necessary information with the chair of the House Appropriations & Budget Education Subcommittee. For an elected official to fail to share numbers requested by a member of the Legislature that will oversee their state budget request is quite honestly foolish. The records requested have been subpoenaed. Not an ideal situation, but here's hoping the information will now be shared and we can move on to the important business of making sure Oklahoma students are best prepared for the future.

Lastly, after three years serving as vice chair of the House Utilities Committee, Speaker Charles McCall has named me chair. This responsibility covers many areas important to our citizens. Most timely now is ensuring our electrical infrastructure meets the demand of our growing state to provide reliable and affordable service to our homes and businesses.


