METHODIST CHURCH FIRE SUNDAY BEFORE SERVICE

Just before services started at 10:30 am Sunday morning, February 4th, a smoke smell was detected in the Hennessey First United Methodist Church Family Center. It was initially thought that something was burned at the pancake supper the day before.

Hennessey Firefighters arrived and focused on a kitchen exhaust fan at the rear of the building with smoke coming out of it. After removing the fan cover a large bird's nest was found burning inside the fan enclosure. The fire was contained to the fan housing and there was minor smoke inside the building. The only damage was to the actual fan, and the church said this would be replaced.

At Long Last: She Gets Deserved Recognition


A 1972 Hennessey High School graduate, Suzie Winingham Byrd will finally receive the accolade that she's deserved for nearly 50 years. Due to the actions, forethought, and tenacity of Scott Hajek, Oklahoma State University honored Byrd at the halftime of the OSU women's basketball game against the University of Oklahoma women on Saturday, February 3, 2024.

An athlete all her life, Suzie played standout basketball in Hennessey back when the game was a 6-woman sport played on only half of the court on offense. She posed a threat on offense and defense on

the court and led the team to many victories. In addition to playing basketball, she was a member of the HHS track and field team which took first place in the very first Oklahoma track meet for high school women in 1972. She enrolled at OSU in 1972 and played basketball during her freshman year, but she changed her emphasis the following year when she turned to track and field events like the hurdles and cross-country; she was a member of the OSU Big 8 Championship team.

Fifty years ago, women's sports didn't receive the attention that they deserved. The powers that be wanted women to participate in PE events as intramural matches, not as real athletic events associated with the NCAA. Therefore, this award serves as a public declaration of the athletic prowess that Byrd had as a young woman and a soft apology to all women athletes who competed in the world of men's sports in a different era.

Byrd became Oklahoma's first female All-American in 1975; her event was the 100-meter hurdles. She competed at major men's track and





PRAGUE 5.1 EARTHQUAKE FELT IN HENNESSEY


A 5.1 magnitude earthquake hit near Prague, Oklahoma on Friday night, according to the U.S. Geological Survey. Thankfully, there were no injuries reported and only minor damage, such as items falling from shelves.

The earthquake occurred at 11:24 p.m. with its epicenter located northwest of Prague, about 57 miles east of Oklahoma City. People from cities across the state, including Lawton, Hennessey, Enid, and Tulsa, felt the tremors.

Several smaller earthquakes followed throughout the night, ranging in strength from 2.5 to 3.4 on the magnitude scale. These aftershocks occurred due to the earthquake's shallow depth of just 2 miles, which can result in more intense shaking.

Oklahoma has experienced strong earthquakes. In January, a suburb of Oklahoma City had six earthquakes, two of which exceeded magnitude 4. And in April, Carney, located northeast of Oklahoma City, was hit by a series of six earthquakes, with one reaching magnitude 4. In 2011, Prague itself was struck by a 5.7 magnitude earthquake,

while Pawnee experienced the state's strongest recorded earthquake in 2016, measuring 5.8.

field events such as the Kansas Relay and the Texas Relay and hoped to be Olympics-bound. She finished fourth in the nation at the Corvallis Track and Field collegiate event in Oregon in 1975. She hung up her running shoes during her senior year because of a lack of funding.

There were no scholarships for female athletes then. Too, she thought it best to concentrate on her studies and graduation in the spring of 1976. The special distinction that Byrd received last Saturday had been delayed for decades. Once, Byrd asked the Daily Oklahoman sportswriter Jenny Carlson to pursue the missing honor, but no one could quite verify the fact of the All-American title. Again, women's sports weren't handled, reported, lauded, or tracked in the same way that men's sports were handled "back in the day." Byrd wanted her name on that All-American list, and who could blame her? Verification has officially been accomplished, and Byrd couldn't be prouder, and neither could Hennessey about its home-grown athlete.

Byrd secured her place in American sports history at Saturday's game. At long last, Suzie Winingham Byrd got the recognition that she so well deserved. There is after all justice in this world. Story by Sara Richter Photo provided.

booths to gather ideas for future field trips and fundraisers. The conference also provides her with the opportunity to network and forge connections with other music educators in the state. She attends the OkMEA Honor Group concerts, which showcase top-performing groups from across Oklahoma, as well as the OkMEA All-State concerts.

Furthermore, Riley currently holds the role of OkMEA State Chair for Circle the State with Song (CTSWS) and is a member of the Children's All State Committee. In these roles, she is responsible for managing and coordinating all aspects of the Children's All State Choir. CTSWS aims to create a memorable choral experience for outstanding music students, allowing them to collaborate with guest clinicians and perform challenging musical pieces alongside their peers in the region.

Oklahoma is divided into 21 regions, each led by a coordinator who supports and guides choral teachers in their respective areas. As the CTSWS Chair, Riley oversees and supports these 21 region coordinators, ensuring they have the necessary information, instructions, and resources for successful Regional Honor Choir Performances.

Additionally, as the chair, Riley plays a role in selecting repertoire that is diverse and appropriate for each age group. She also writes articles introducing the CTSWS repertoire for publication in the Oklahoma Music Educators magazine. Hennessey is pleased to have Mrs. Riley Faulkner as part of Hennessey Public Schools.
