CEMETERY EXPANSION PROJECT UNDERWAY

During the March 13, 2025, Town Trustees Meeting, the Board approved a cemetery expansion project to accommodate future burial needs as the current space nears capacity. The Board awarded an \$8,200 contract to Gladiator Construction to begin leveling and grading the newly acquired land.

In December 2019, Scott Hajek and the Town reached an agreement. Scott traded the five acres of land he owned, which adjoins the north side of Hennessey Cemetery, for the mineral rights beneath the ten acres of existing cemetery land owned by the Town. This was an even trade, and no money was exchanged.

The project will include drainage improvements, grass planting, and plot mapping to ensure the space is well-organized and maintained. Additionally, town officials are researching drought-resistant grass options to keep maintenance costs low while preserving a respectful environment. Future steps include surveying for burial plots and planning road access within the expansion. Photo AAN AirCam





HENNESSEY BOARD REVIEWS COUNTY YARD EXPANSION REQUEST

At the March 13, 2025, Hennessey Board of Trustees meeting, County Commissioner Mike Sparks proposed an expansion of the county yard to allow for additional storage space for road maintenance materials. The request comes as the county seeks to stockpile gravel, rock, and other supplies to ensure quicker response times for road repairs and emergency maintenance.

The land that Sparks is interested in is located west of the current County yard at the intersection of Oklahoma and Arapaho St. This land, owned by the Town of Hennessey, was the former dump site at the corner of Oklahoma and Cemetery Rd.

The board expressed support for the proposal and agreed to work with the county to determine how much land could be allocated for the expansion. Discussions will also include potential impacts on nearby properties and town infrastructure, including the possibility of using part of the expanded area for additional rodeo parking.

Officials emphasized the importance of collaboration between the county and town, ensuring that both maintenance needs and community event space are properly addressed. A final agreement is expected to be discussed at a future board meeting. photo AAN AirCam

HENNESSEY FIRE DEPARTMENT ASSIST GEARY PUBLIC SCHOOL FIRE

On Saturday night, March 22, 2025, the old gym next to Geary High School caught fire. A deputy noticed the flames just before 10 p.m. and quickly called for backup. Several fire departments, including Hennessey's, rushed in to help. Thankfully, they kept the fire mostly contained to the gym, but it did manage to spread a bit into the high school itself, damaging some bathrooms, a janitor's closet, and a classroom wall. Right now, nobody knows exactly what caused the fire.

The firefighters worked incredibly hard through the night. Blaine County Emergency Management Director Jim Shelton said they did an awesome job keeping things under control. Unfortunately, even with their quick response, some classrooms had smoke and water damage. The community took it hard, especially former students, who shared their sadness at seeing their old school in flames. Geary Superintendent Sean Buchanan said there wouldn't be school on-site Monday, but they're working hard to get students back in class later in the week.

Hennessey firefighters Brandon Scott, Levi Copeland, Matthew Bruner, and Luis Lara were part of the team that responded. The initial call was for tanker trucks, but on their way, it shifted to a need for more manpower. When they got there, the main fire was mostly knocked down, but there was still plenty to do. The team relieved another crew and focused on putting out remaining flames and hot spots, making sure the fire didn't spread further. They stayed until about 7:45 a.m., helping pack up equipment before heading home. Back at the station, they cleaned their gear carefully to remove harmful substances and ensure they were ready for the next call.



FIRE'S FURY

HENNESSEY, OK – Hennessey firefighters faced a fiery challenge Wednesday, March 19th, as they raced to contain a rapidly spreading grass fire. Fueled by strong northwest winds gusting over 40 mph and swirling sand, the blaze



erupted near 16491 E. 650 Rd. (Exxon Rd.), right in front of Sooner Solid Solutions, around 5 p.m.

The Hennessey Fire Department deployed three brush trucks, a tanker, and a command unit to the scene. YOUR HOMETOWN BREADDY CROCKER

Hi. I'm Summer. You may have seen my new Facebook account recently and wondered if it was real. It is! I have had my sourdough starter (Mable) since 2020 and recently decided that I enjoyed baking sourdough enough to offer some for sale. I'm a nurse by trade and I do work full time, so I post on my Breaddy Crocker Facebook page when I have loaves available. I only bake small-batch artisan loaves so they don't seem to last long. But I do bake weekly, every chance I get.

I started my sourdough journey back in 2020 by watching YouTube videos created by Farmhouse on Boone. She is a stay at home mom in Missouri who makes all of her family's food from scratch. She is an inspiration to me and I followed her instructions on making my own sourdough starter. For the first couple of years I stuck to very easy sourdough things such as pancakes and English muffins and cinnamon rolls. It wasn't until this year that I felt like I truly mastered an artisan loaf. Then I figured out what I feel like makes a loaf stay softer and fresher longer. Olive oil and honey. I share videos of my process on our OKSeasonedsisters TikTok, Instagram and my Breaddy Crocker Facebook page. I share recipes and tips on sourdough as well as post what loaves I have available for purchase.



you're wondering what the big deal is with sourdough, first of all, give it a try. The flavor and texture of sourdough is unique and so delicious. The fermentation time that sourdough needs helps to break down gluten and for this reason, those who have a gluten sensitivity seem to be able to tolerate sourdough in moderation. This same fermentation process helps sourdough be more glycemic stable. This means that sourdough doesn't spike your blood sugar like a typical loaf of store-bought bread. For

me, I love the handling of the dough. It's so satisfying to watch flour, water, salt, olive oil, honey, and a little malted barley flour go from being a mess of ingredients in a bowl to a smooth mass of dough, ready to shape and bake. Can't forget to mention the fun loaves! Double chocolate, chocolate chip, s'mores...these are some examples of specialty loaves that are such a treat. I hope you give them a try! Both #8 and #11 were formidable in the lineup, each driving in three runs. #6 also contributed with two hits in two at-bats. 
CHISHOLM OUTPLAYS HENNESSEY VARSITY EAGLES IN 7-3 MONDAY MATCHUP


STAY SAFE WITH JORDAN AIR: AWARENESS AROUND CROP PLANES




