

JOSH MELOY OKLAHOMA'S RISING COUNTRY Star Carving his own path in Music

Josh Meloy, from Hennessey, Oklahoma, is making his mark in country music. His sound is raw and real, connecting deeply with listeners. Meloy says, "Growing up in Oklahoma shapes my songwriting and style. It definitely relates to my background." I feel lucky that we live in a time when raw music is so popular." He points out that today's independent artists don't have to take the usual paths. They don't have to spend



big bucks in Nashville studios or get influenced by shows like "The Voice." Instead, they succeed through grassroots efforts and the power of streaming services. This lets them reach national audiences without needing radio play.



Meloy's path as an independent artist has had its challenges. He credits his success to hard work and the chances modern technology offers. "I recorded more songs at home, so I could release several quickly," he explains. His smart strategy has helped him grow a loyal fan base, especially in the Midwest. He has spent years building connections by returning to the same cities to perform. "Every time I come back, more people show up. They take you in and almost adopt you as family," he

says. This highlights how important touring and word-of-mouth are.

One of Meloy's best songs, "Met the Devil in Oklahoma," is a fan favorite. It's themes resonate with many listeners. When asked about the song's inspiration, Meloy says, "There was no real inspiration—it just came to me." I've always had random ideas like this my whole life." The song talks


Gene and Connie Barnes may not have graduated from Hennessey High School, but they have made a significant impact on the school system and the community. Gene was raised in Garber, Oklahoma, by his parents, David and Edna Barnes. He graduated from Garber High School in 1967 and went on to attend the University of Oklahoma and Panhandle State University, where he played football.

Connie was raised in Lahoma by her parents, Vernon and Wynona Kuhnemund. She graduated from Lahoma High School in 1968 and attended Southwestern Oklahoma State University (SWOSU) after graduation. Gene and Connie married in 1972, and while Connie taught in Yarbrough, Gene completed his education.

After two years of teaching in Texas, the couple moved to Hennessey in 1975. Connie first taught at Dover for four years before joining the Hennessey school system. At Hennessey, she taught high school for one semester before moving to middle school, where she taught 7th and 8th-grade American History, Geography, and Current Events. Connie also coached middle school girls' basketball for a year, facilitated quiz bowl, and managed the middle school webpage.

Gene coached football and baseball before transitioning to teach elementary PE and science

classes in high school. He later became the athletic director and worked in alternative education during evenings. Gene retired in 2012 but continues to work part-time in farming. Connie retired in 2009, and she has since been actively involved in teaching Sunday School at The First Christian Church in Hennessey for Pre-K and Kindergarten children. She started the Back to School Bash in 2010 and continues to contribute to this event each year. Additionally, Connie volunteers her time to help with the Teacher Back to School Luncheon annually and coordinates blood drives in Hennessey for the Oklahoma Blood Institute (OBI).



Both Gene and Connie are active members of the First Christian Church in Hennessey. They have two children: Brady and Brett. Brady graduated from Hennessey High School in 1995 and has served as the Principal at Hennessey; he is currently the Superintendent at Blanchard. He and his wife, Cara, have three children: Cameron (24), Cassidy (18), and Callen (14). Cameron works for Damian Hugaboom at Hennessey Metal Buildings. Brett graduated from Hennessey High School in 1997 and has been the principal at Chisholm Middle School for several years. He and his late wife, Amy, have two children: Brylee (18) and Brayson (15).

In 2018, following the death of Connie's mother, they moved to Enid to be closer to the farmland Connie inherited in Lahoma. Connie and Gene are now actively involved in farming alongside Brett. The family has taken many trips together, both before and after retirement, and Gene and Connie have visited nearly all 50 states. Both are cancer survivors and are doing well. 





LADY EAGLES SECURE AREA WIN BEFORE FALLING SHORT IN SECOND ROUND

The Lady Eagles opened the Area tournament with a thrilling 37-35 victory over Heritage Hall before seeing their postseason run come to an end against No. 2-ranked Community Christian in a 47-31 loss.

Facing Heritage Hall in the first round, the Lady Eagles overcame a slow start after being held scoreless from the field for the first five minutes.



The Chargers led 9-1 after the first quarter, but Hennessey responded with a dominant second quarter, outscoring Heritage Hall 19-4 to take control at halftime.

Momentum swung again in the third quarter, but a clutch performance from Starr Torres helped the Lady Eagles extend their lead. Heritage Hall mounted a furious comeback in the fourth, tying the game with less than a minute remaining, but Ally Painter delivered the decisive bucket inside to seal the win and keep Hennessey's postseason hopes alive.

In their next matchup, the Lady Eagles battled Community Christian in a high-stakes elimination game. The Royals opened with an 8-0 run, but Hennessey quickly responded with a 10-0 surge of its own, setting up a back-and-forth contest. At halftime, the Lady Eagles held a narrow 21-20 lead.

The third quarter remained tightly contested, but Community Christian edged ahead with timely shooting. In the fourth, the Royals took over, closing the game on a decisive run to put it out of reach. From the Pulpit ~ First Christian Church

The Bible warns us to "fear the Lord" several times. That used to always bother me, as a follower of Jesus, because it seemed strange to fear the One I loved. We often hear that 'true love drives out all fear', and while there is something to that, it echoes the thoughts of this world more than of our God. But then I started thinking about fear...

One of the worst fears we all face is one we have convinced ourselves does not exist: peer pressure. As adults, we like to pat ourselves on the back for having out grown worrying about what others think about us. We think that because we don't have bullies and get along well with most of the folk in our lives, we are not subject to peer pressure's power.

Think on that the next time you hear about the "best selling truck in Oklahoma" or "America's new favorite!" We are so afraid of what people think of us that we tend to contort and bend our lives to fit the

"acceptable". We tend to fear humans, and not worry about God.

The story that really helped me understand the meaning of "fear the Lord" is found in 2 Samuel. I thank David Crowder and his band for their song, "Undignified", for highlighting this story. King David is having the Ark of the Covenant moved into Jerusalem. He goes out and leads the procession with dancing, prayer, and sacrifices. As the day warms, he strips down until he is in only "a linen ephod." And his wife chastises him.

"You have embarrassed yourself in front of all of Israel" she tells David. His response, "It was for the Lord that I danced. And, if it pleases Him, I can become even more undignified than this." David understood that fearing, or rather, respecting God's opinion was far more important than respecting any other opinion.

So, ask yourself, "Who do I fear?" The people around you at work? The looks of folk at Wal-Mart? Or do you fear the Lord: the giver of Life? We are called to love the Lord with all our heart, mind, soul, and strength. But, we should always fear disappointing Him more than we worry about how cool our neighbors think we are.

NEW HIRE, RECOGNITION, AND PROMOTIONS AT KGFR CO. SO




