EARLY MORNING FIRE DISPLACES HENNESSEY FAMILY



Hennessey firefighters responded to a house fire early Sunday morning, May 25th, that broke out around 1:45 a.m. at a residence located at 708 S. Main Street. Homeowners Logan and Georgia Tillman told All About Hennessey that they had just gotten into bed when they were awakened by the sound of the smoke detector.

Hennessey Police Officer Luis Rojo was at Love's, across the street, when he heard screams for help coming from 708 S. Main Street. Upon his arrival, the homeowners informed him that their garage was on fire. Officer Rojo quickly radioed dispatch to contact the Hennessey Fire Department.

According to a report from the Hennessey Fire Department, the blaze is believed to have started in the garage. Most of the damage occurred in the garage and attic space above the living area. The rest of the home sustained smoke and water damage. The car in the garage was a total loss.

The Tillmans said this was the first night their baby was with an overnight sitter and not at home. No injuries were reported, but sadly, two small dogs were lost in the fire.

The family had just completed renovations to the home after a grease fire that occurred on March 10, 2024.

The Hennessey Fire Department worked for about an hour to bring the fire under control. Main Street (Highway 81) was closed to traffic until approximately 3:30 a.m. as firefighters worked to extinguish the flames and secure the scene.

TWO VEHICLE WRECK TEMPORARILY CLOSES HIGHWAY 81 SOUTH OF HENNESSEY

Both northbound lanes of U.S. Highway 81 were temporarily shut down early Monday morning following a two-vehicle collision just south of E 640 Road, approximately one mile south of Hennessey.

The incident occurred around 6:53 a.m. on May 26. According to the Oklahoma Highway Patrol (OHP), a Titewater semi-truck driven by Luis Orozco of Enid was traveling in the right northbound lane and slowing to make a right turn into the Titewater Trucking yard. A passenger car, also in the right lane and driven by Micha Carman of Kingfisher, collided with the rear of the semi-trailer.

The OHP report stated that the driver of the passenger car was distracted by an electronic device at the time of the crash.

Carman was transported by LiFE-EMS ambulance to St. Mary's Hospital in Enid, where she was treated for minor injuries and later released. The semi-truck remained operational and was able to leave the scene under its own power. M6 Wrecker Service recovered the passenger vehicle.




QUICK WORK AVOIDED WATER SHUT-OFF

CRUSHING DISABILITY: THE CENTER OF FAMILY LOVE'S MISSION TO EMPOWER THROUGH PURPOSE



In a heartwarming and enlightening All About Network Show, Sean, the COO of the Center of Family Love (CFL), shared the powerful mission behind this unique organization based in Okarche, Oklahoma. CFL provides lifelong residential care and vocational opportunities for adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD). With 130 residents living on campus, ranging from those needing full-time nursing in Intermediate Care Facilities (ICF) to more independent group homes, CFL fosters a sense of purpose, family, and dignity.

At the heart of CFL's philosophy is the idea of "removing the DISS from disability." This shift in focus highlights what individuals can do, rather than what they can't. Residents work in businesses like a filter shop, a floral shop, a t-shirt printing shop, and a horticulture operation that supplies top restaurants with microgreens. One resident, Shea, is so skilled in floral design that she now trains incoming florists. Another, Travis, creates comicbook quality illustrations and has even developed his own character, "Travman."

Beyond employment, CFL offers programming in culinary arts, STEM, dance, fitness, and life skills for those not yet ready for outside work. These activities not only build confidence but also cultivate daily independence and joy.

A major development on the horizon is CFL's capital campaign for a new Career Training and Development Center in Piedmont. This facility will serve youth starting at age 16 through adulthood, bridging the often-overlooked transition from high school to the workforce for people with IDD and autism. With 14 planned program areas and an integrated career placement model, including business partnerships and job coaching, CFL aims to empower hundreds more every year.

The recent premiere of CFL's documentary, now an award-winning film, captured the world through the eyes of its residents. Personalities like Daisy and her thought-provoking statements showed the emotional depth and wisdom of the community. As Sean said, visiting the CFL is life-changing; the love and pride among the residents is palpable. For many, CFL isn't just a place to live or work; it's home.

By unlocking potential and shifting perceptions, CFL is truly "crushing disability" and building a more inclusive future, one empowered life at a time.

If you've strolled down Main Street in Kingfisher, Oklahoma, recently and caught a whiff of something warm, rich, and sweet in the air, chances are, you've walked past 81 Bakehouse.

"We wanted everything from scratch. High quality. No shortcuts." And they mean it. Their most popular cookie? A sourdough chocolate chip that balances chewy texture with tangy depth. Close behind is the classic snickerdoodle, which surprised even Curtis with its strong fan base.

While the cookies are a major draw, 81 Bakehouse isn't stopping there. From slow-fermented sourdough loaves to hand-prepped sandwiches (yes, with house-sliced meats and cheeses), everything they serve is done with heart. Curtis promises even more on the horizon, breakfast items, healthier options, and perhaps one day even croissants once they can handle the complexity the right way.

Their coffee game? Serious. His son handles the barista side, sourcing locally roasted beans from Oklahoma City and crafting a custom proprietary blend. With full barista equipment and attention to detail at every step, from bean to brew, it's safe to say the drinks are just as carefully curated as the pastries.

What truly sets 81 Bakehouse apart is its community spirit. "We wanted this to be a way to serve," said Curtis. Whether it's taking custom cookie orders, participating in local events, or simply being open for afterschool visits, the Walkers have created a warm space where people feel welcome.

Curtis and his family have big dreams and even bigger hearts. With 81 Bakehouse, they're not just baking, they're building something rooted in love, faith, and community.



FROM THE PULPIT

What is God worth to you? I listened to the "Everyday Disciple" podcast today, and he asked a similar question. He pointed out that today, in Afghanistan, people are going house to house and searching for signs of Christian faith. If you have a few pages of a Bible, if you have a "Christian" app on your phone, or if you have any artwork that is Christian in nature, they kill you. To be faithful to Christ, including the Great Commission's mission of making disciples, carries great cost over there.



The podcast pointed out that in the US, the cost of discipleship is often "trying" to fit in Sunday worship or maybe blocking out some time to watch the replay of last Sunday's gathering. The cost of discipleship here is about convenience: and we often fail to be able to pay that modest price.

We have created a society that puts such a low value on faith and relationship with God, that we don't even bother teaching our children about our most important relationship. All attention is toward getting to college, getting to a career, getting themselves self-supporting. So, when Sunday and Wednesday roll around taking some time to be young, to sleep, to work all take priority.

Human society has always strived for sufficiency without God. This is nothing new, but it has become exacerbated over the last few decades. We cannot change things overnight, but we can begin to help our youth, our future, to see the importance of having a living relationship with God. We can take the time to share Biblical stories on car drives; to pray at night; to read Scripture together; and to take time to put a little love into the world. The question really is, "What is God worth to you?" Is God worth showing to your children? Or, is that too much of a hassle? What would an Afghani Christian say?

Bonnie and Clyde

I recently found a couple of newspaper clippings that flooded my memories! While attending college, my summer job was working at Hennessey's Farmer's Coop. Most of my coworkers had bohemian names like Patocka and Fuksa. My responsibilities varied, but the most important task was making sure the coffee was ready early in the morning before what everyone referred to as "Class" started. This "Class" began around 7:30 every morning, where they would solve the world's problems or at least share their opinions on how things should be.



One of my duties was sweeping the front driveway of the station. A member of the "Class" often parked his pickup truck and horse trailer right in front of the station, blocking the driveway with mud and animal droppings that I had to clean up—especially after a lot of rain. This situation went on for quite some time until my coworker and partner in crime, Alfred, came up with a plan. The farmer would toss me his truck keys and ask me to move it to the back after I complained about the obstruction in the front.

One rainy morning, when the keys were tossed my way, I seized the opportunity. I drove the pickup around to the back but parked it right next to the biggest water hole I could find, making it necessary to wade through the water to get back into the driver's side. I crawled out the passenger door and locked it behind me. After that, the farmer stopped parking in the front driveway.

During my time there, I learned to patch tires and change oil. I even picked up a few Bohemian swear words, or at least I thought I did. I also once tried chewing tobacco, which didn't end well; my complexion leaned toward a green hue afterward. "Babicka" means grandma in Czech, and one of my favorite customers was a woman named Bobbie Vaverka. I always wondered if "Bobbie" was her real name or if no one could pronounce "Grandma" correctly in Czech and settled on "Bobbie." You'll have to ask her grandchildren about that.

Bobbie drove whatever car her grandsons left at her house, often a souped-up vehicle with wide rear tires. She was short and could barely see over the steering wheel. Bobbie was known for collecting whatever produce the grocery store was throwing out for her ducks, chickens, or geese. I recognized this because I could smell the lingering aroma of her collections whenever I went to



gas up the car. While she was tiny, she was also spunky, and I adored her character. My favorite time while working at the coop was during the harvest season. Wheat trucks would line up on Main Street, waiting their turn to dump the grain. Back then, before cell phones and bottled water, there were CB radios mounted in the cabs of the trucks, and you could hear all the chatter. The wheat trucks needed servicing each season; sometimes wiring had to be replaced, depending on what critters might have nested under the hood. Gears would grind slowly while driving to town, and the floorboards of some trucks had worn away, offering a scenic view of the road below. It felt like a collective effort, and it was amazing to have a small part in the harvest. The days were long, with homemade food being delivered to the fields. When combines broke down, the fields often turned into makeshift mechanic shops.

I didn't have a problem with mosquitoes; my mom said it was because I smelled like diesel. She wouldn't allow my work shoes in the house; they had a designated spot in the garage, and no matches were allowed near them!

During my last summer, Marla joined us, and that's when our "Bonnie & Clyde" promotion came into being. I had already been nicknamed "Sammy," except for one farmer who simply referred to me as "Girl." Years later, while I was in my department at Pioneer Telephone, I received a call to come over to the cellular office. One of the farmers was there with questions! I didn't know any more than the other girls, but they knew he'd listen to me, and for whatever reason, he trusted my input on his phone queries. It felt like a full circle back to my days at the Farmers Coop. Many of the names I remember have passed, and the building has changed its name, but I still drive by and reminisce about a different time!

Note: it's important to be completely honest and alone when taking the quiz to discover your personality type as your answers may vary based on your role or relationship with who's around. Answer what is most true, most often.



Wherever you find yourself on your mental health journey, please know that you are not alone. 




TRISTAN HLADIK'S JOURNEY — ONE TOUGH KID


