KINGFISHER COUNTY COMMISSIONER OUTLINES ROAD PLANS FOR GRITZ ACRES RESIDENTS



About 20 Residents of the Gritz Acres addition met with Kingfisher County Commissioner Mike Sparks on Wednesday, May 29, at the Gathering Place to discuss upcoming road improvements and community infrastructure plans for the area. Gritz Acres is located along E. Conoco Rd. (E640 Rd.) and extends south on Mitchell Rd.

Sparks outlined his strategy to address road conditions using cost-effective techniques like grinding and double-chip and seal. He contrasted this method with the significantly higher cost of traditional four-inch overlays, noting that chip and seal costs about \$100,000 per mile compared to up to \$800,000 for overlays.

Sparks also outlined the plan to repair Conoco Rd from Hwy 81 to S Mitchell, all of S Mitchell between Conoco and Exxon Rd, and all of Exxon Rd between S Mitchell and Hwy 81.

Other action items discussed include setting a consistent 35 mph speed limit, coordinating with residents on driveway culvert installations, and addressing drainage and sinkhole issues before major repairs begin. Photos by AAH Jack Quirk

CRUSHING DISABILITY: THE CENTER OF FAMILY LOVE'S MISSION TO EMPOWER THROUGH PURPOSE

In a heartwarming and enlightening All About Network Show, Shawn, the COO of the Center of Family Love (CFL), shared the powerful mission behind this unique organization based in Okarche, Oklahoma. CFL provides lifelong residential care and vocational opportunities for adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD). With 130 residents living on campus, ranging from those needing full-time nursing in Intermediate Care Facilities (ICF) to more independent group homes, CFL fosters a sense of purpose, family, and dignity.

At the heart of CFL's philosophy is the idea of "removing the DISS from disability." This shift in focus highlights what individuals can do, rather than what they can't. Residents work in businesses like a filter shop, a floral shop, a t-shirt printing shop, and a horticulture operation that supplies top restaurants with microgreens. One resident, Shea, is so skilled in floral design that she now trains incoming florists. Another, Travis, creates comic-book quality illustrations and has even developed his own character, "Travman."

Beyond employment, CFL offers programming in culinary arts, STEM, dance, fitness, and life skills for those not yet ready for outside work. These activities not only build confidence but also cultivate daily independence and joy.

A major development on the horizon is CFL's capital campaign for a new Career Training and Development Center in Piedmont. This facility will serve youth starting at age 16 through adulthood, bridging the often-overlooked transition from high school to the workforce for people with IDD and autism. With 14 planned program areas and an integrated career placement model, including business partnerships and job coaching, CFL aims to empower hundreds more every year









The recent premiere of CFL's documentary, now an award-winning film, captured the world through the eyes of its residents. Personalities like Daisy and her thought-provoking statements showed the emotional depth and wisdom of the community. As Shawn said, visiting the CFL is life-changing; the love and pride among the residents is palpable. For many, CFL isn't just a place to live or work; it's home.

Fact vs. Folklore: What to Do When a Tornado Strikes

Each year, tornadoes tear across parts of the United States, leaving trails of destruction in their wake. From the infamous "Tornado Alley" to areas less traditionally associated with twisters, the impact of these storms is as far-reaching as the myths that surround them.

Despite advances in meteorology and emergency alert systems, misconceptions about tornadoes continue to thrive. These myths can lead people to make poor, and sometimes fatal, decisions during severe weather events. It's time to separate fact from fiction and equip ourselves with the knowledge we need to stay safe.

COMMON MISCONCEPTIONS ABOUT TORNADOES

Myth 1: Tornadoes don't strike big cities, mountains, or cross rivers.

This is one of the most dangerous misconceptions. While it's true that tornadoes may be less frequent in certain areas due to geographical patterns, they do not discriminate. Tornadoes have hit downtown areas of cities like Nashville, Atlanta, and Dallas. They have crossed rivers, formed in valleys, and even touched down in mountainous regions. In fact, urban areas can be more hazardous due to higher population density and more debris.

Myth 2: Opening windows will prevent your house from exploding.

This myth dates back to a time when pressure differences during a tornado were misunderstood. The idea was that opening windows would equalize the pressure inside and outside a home, preventing it from "exploding." In reality, the violent winds and flying debris are what cause damage, not pressure. Opening windows simply invites debris and strong winds into your home and wastes time that should be spent seeking shelter.

Myth 3: Seeking shelter under an overpass is safe.

This myth became widespread after video footage during a 1991 tornado showed people surviving under an overpass. However, experts now warn that overpasses can become wind tunnels, intensifying wind speeds and sucking debris through the narrow space. It's one of the worst places to be during a tornado. Instead, seek shelter in a sturdy building or low-lying ditch if no other option is available.

Myth 4: Tornadoes are always visible.

Many believe that if they don't see a funnel cloud, they're safe. In reality, tornadoes can be shrouded in rain or darkness, especially during nighttime storms or in regions where "rain-wrapped" tornadoes are common. Also, the condensate from the clouds doesn't have to reach all the way to the ground for the tornado to be considered "on the ground." The winds often reach the ground before the clouds do. Don't wait until you see it, act when a warning is issued.

Myth 5: Tornadoes only happen in the spring.

While spring is the peak season for tornadoes in many parts of the country, tornadoes can occur in any month. In recent years, unusual weather patterns have triggered deadly outbreaks in the fall and winter. Tornado preparedness should be a year-round habit.

TORNADO SAFETY: WHAT TO DO BEFORE, DURING, AND AFTER A STORM Before a Tornado: Be Prepared

Create a family emergency plan. Know where to go and how to communicate with loved ones. Build an emergency kit. Include water, non-perishable food, flashlights, a radio, batteries, first-aid supplies, and medications.

Know your local alerts. Sign up for local emergency notifications, and make sure your phone's alerts are enabled. A NOAA weather radio is especially useful in case of power loss.

Identify your safe place. Ideally, this should be a basement or an interior room on the lowest level of your home, away from windows and exterior

walls.

During a Tornado: Take Immediate Action Go to your safe place immediately when a tornado warning is issued. Don't wait for sirens or visual confirmation.

Cover yourself with heavy blankets, a mattress, or helmets to protect against flying debris. Put shoes on in case you need to walk through debris afterward.

If you're in a mobile home or vehicle, evacuate. Mobile homes offer little protection during tornadoes. Find shelter in a nearby sturdy building.

If no shelter is available, lie flat in a ditch or low-lying area, cover your head, and stay alert for flooding.

After a Tornado: Stay Alert

Listen to emergency officials. Stay tuned to your NOAA radio, local media, or weather app

for updates.

Avoid downed power lines and report them to authorities.

Be cautious around debris. Nails, glass, and other hazards can pose serious risks.

Check on neighbors, especially the elderly or disabled, who may need help or be unaware of alerts.

WHY EDUCATION MATTERS

Each year, tornadoes kill an average of 70 people in the U.S. and injure over 1,500, according to the National Weather Service. Many of these deaths and injuries are preventable with proper knowledge and preparation. The more we understand tornadoes - how they form, how they behave, and how to respond, the better equipped we are to survive them.

Tornadoes are among the most violent weather phenomena on Earth, but they don't have to be deadly. Myths and misinformation can be just as dangerous as the storms themselves. By embracing facts, preparing early, and acting quickly, you can protect yourself and your loved ones when the sirens sound. This tornado season, don't rely on luck, trust the science, have a plan, and stay weather-aware.





Senate Minutes with Senator Chuck Hall June 2, 2025

The Senate adjourned Sine Die on Friday, ending a productive four-month legislative session. We passed hundreds of policy bills and fulfilled our constitutional duty by passing a balanced budget that takes effect July 1. This marked the end of my first full year serving as the Senate's Appropriations Chairman, a job I take very seriously. I'm still deeply honored that the Senate President Pro Tem appointed me to this position.

I want to highlight a few of the investments this budget makes in public education. This budget increases common education funding by \$121 million, which includes a \$26 million increase that goes directly into the school



funding formula. This funding increase is tied to legislation extending the minimum teacher salary schedule to ensure our most experienced teachers receive a salary that's commensurate with their years of service. Another new appropriation ensures that the children of teachers with at least ten years of experience are eligible for Oklahoma's Promise scholarship.

This budget also allocates \$5 million for a new program that strengthens the teacher pipeline. The Grow Your Own Educator initiative will bring more qualified teachers into the classroom by providing districts with matching funds to support local school employees pursuing an undergraduate degree in education and a teaching certificate. Additionally, there's a modest appropriation that will offer grants to schools that commit to going cellphone-free for at least three years. This appropriation complements a new law that requires all public schools to restrict student phone use throughout the 2025-2026 school year, which is an important step toward eliminating classroom distractions. Finally, this budget includes an increase in funding to support teachers' benefits, such as paid maternity leave.

Also included in the state budget is a tax reform package that will simplify Oklahoma's tax code and return money to all taxpayers. The state will restructure its six income tax brackets into just three brackets on taxable income. This will make our tax system easier to understand and fairer for taxpayers at all income levels. It will also put Oklahoma closer to having a flat tax.

As part of the Senate's commitment to making the state budget process more open, we recently launched the Senate Budget Transparency Dashboard. This interactive website offers the public a clear and detailed look at how all taxpayer dollars are being spent. The dashboard breaks down funding for each state agency and every line item in the budget. It also includes the details of past budgets so people can see how state spending has changed over time. I appreciate the Senate's staff for all the hard work they put into bringing this tool to fruition. You can see the Senate Budget Transparency Dashboard at oksenate.gov/appropriations.

In the final days of the session, the Senate confirmed dozens of the governor's appointments to various positions within state government. It was truly an honor to guide several outstanding Oklahomans from my district through the Senate confirmation process. I carried the nomination of Dennis Casey, who was appointed to the State Regents for Higher Education after more than three decades working in public education. I also carried the nominations of Dr. Shannon Ferrell to the Environmental Quality Board, Dr. Preston Morgan to join the State Board of Behavioral Health Licensure and Robert Moses to serve on the Commission on Consumer Credit.
