SPECIAL MEETING ADDRESSES ONGOING WATER METER CONCERNS



The Town Trustees met for a special meeting at the Senior Citizen Center, expecting a large crowd.

The Hennessey Board of Trustees held a special meeting on Wednesday, August 27th, to address ongoing problems with the town's new water meters. Expecting a large turnout, the meeting was moved to the Hennessey Senior Citizen Center, but only about a dozen residents attended.

Mayor Randy Bohnstedt opened the meeting by urging attendees to stay focused on the discussion regarding the water meter. He then introduced Jeff Shultz and TJ Powell from Utility Technology Services (UTS), the company that supplied the town's meters. Powell, an AMI Meter Specialist, gave a detailed presentation on how the Sensus MTR iPerl meters work and how they integrate with Hennessey's current system.

Several residents with backgrounds in gas measurement asked technical questions about how the meters function and how they should be installed. Currently, town staff must visit each meter every 30 days, using a handheld wand to collect data. If a sensor fails, the meter must be read manually.

To improve efficiency, the town has purchased a new Automated Meter Reading (AMR) system. Once installed, an antenna on the water tower will communicate with all meters hourly, transmitting usage data directly to Town Hall. Powell explained that this system can also send alerts when abnormal water use is detected, allowing issues to be caught and resolved much sooner than the current monthly cycle.

Mayor Bohnstedt added that the town is exploring mobile apps that would allow residents to track their water usage and receive notifications if unusual activity occurs.

However, when asked about unexplained spikes in usage, such as meters recording high water flow at 2 a.m., UTS representatives said they could not provide answers.

STOLEN VEHICLE RECOVERED SUSPECTS ARRESTED

According to police reports, Brittany Dexter told officers her vehicle, a Gray 2014 S60R Volvo, quit running on June 29th, so she left it in the Eagle Mart parking lot with permission from the store's owners. When her parents drove by on the morning of July 4th, the car was gone.

Officer Matthew Bruner with the Hennessey Police Department started his investigation. Eagle Mart employee Mike Patel recalled seeing two men haul the vehicle away on July 3 with a truck and trailer, assuming the owner had arranged the pickup. Surveillance footage from Gilliland Oil and Gas confirmed two men loaded the car and drove off. One of the suspects was later spotted on video walking into Pizza Hut shortly before the theft.

The Hennessey Police Department released photos from the footage on the department's Facebook page, which quickly generated tips. The individual was later identified to police as Kory Allen Dotson, also known as Kory Allen Barney. Witnesses and family members linked Dotson and his stepbrother Paul Barney to the white Dodge pickup seen in the videos.

On July 7, Dotson called the department himself and admitted to taking the vehicle. The next day, he came to the station, was read his rights, confessed on record that he thought the car was "junk" and told them he planned to strip the vehicle for parts. Dotson told Officer Bruner that a friend, Terry Cantrell, set up the deal after a Pizza Hut employee allegedly agreed to let the car go for \$50. Dotson and Cantrell were arrested and transported to the Kingfisher County Jail on a charge of motor vehicle theft.

Enid Police Department located the vehicle in Enid and returned it to the owner in its original condition.

The investigation raised questions about the involvement of others, including a Pizza Hut employee who illegally gave permission to tow the vehicle. Messages obtained by police show that at least one employee later asked a manager to delete surveillance video from that day. Police say the case remains open, and additional charges may follow.

Authorities have not yet released the driver's name. No injuries were reported in the incident.

WORK READY ENID IS HELPING RESIDENTS BUILD MEANINGFUL CAREERS

Residents in Oklahoma seeking a career boost have a powerful resource in Work Ready Enid, a workforce development program designed to help Oklahomans not only find jobs but build meaningful careers. Rachel Harris and Jody Bradford, representatives of Work Ready Enid, recently sat down for a webshow interview to explain how the program benefits the community.

"At its core, Work Ready helps people communicate the value they bring to a company," Harris said. "It's not always the person with the best skills who gets the job, it's the one who can best present themselves."

The program offers free, week-long workshops once a month at CDSA, 114 South Independence, right on the square in downtown Enid. Participants receive professional resume writing, job coaching, and interview preparation tailored to their career interests. "We don't just hand out generic resumes," Bradford explained. "Our writers create resumes specific to the job you want, and our coaches help you feel confident walking into an interview."

Work Ready is open to anyone 18 and older who is unemployed, changing careers, or interested in remote work. The program's hands-on approach and long-term support distinguish it from staffing agencies. "We don't just place people in any job," Harris said. "We help them find work that matches their skills and passions, leading to long-term success."

In addition to workshops, Work Ready hosts a major fall job fair, Worklahoma, which returns September 9 at the Stride Center. Already, more than 18 businesses are committed to attending, with more expected to join.

Perhaps the most unique feature of Work Ready is its ongoing support. "Once in Work Ready, always in Work Ready," Bradford said. "We follow up with participants and continue to provide resources even after they're hired."

BANANA BREAD

Is there a better transition-to-fall food than banana bread?? You don't have to answer that...we're just gonna go with it. Let's call it the "flannel of food." It's perfect for transitioning to cooler weather; actually it's perfect for everything. It's so versatile! Do you need a breakfast idea? Banana bread. Do you need a yummy after school snack idea? Banana bread. Do you have bananas going bad? Banana bread. Maybe you've had this happen — last week you bought bananas and they were gone in two days; so you bought more bananas and they've gone uneaten? Banana bread! Our brother, Joseph, likes to see what all he can "French Toast"...like it's a verb. If you've ever wondered if banana bread can be French toasted _ the answer is yes! Yes it can! And it's soooo good! Definitely give it a try if you never have before!

We have two very different but both very delicious recipes to share with you today. Both come from our Berkenbile Family cookbooks. One is lighter in color and more cake-like in texture (think of it as if banana bread and wedding cake had a love child. +this one is Autumn's favorite) and the other is more of a classic banana bread ~ darker, dense and more banana-y (aka the banana bread of our childhood +Summer's favorite).

Banana Bread (Autumn's fave) -
—makes 3 loaves—
3 c sugar
1 c salted butter, softened (2 sticks)
4 eggs
1 tsp vanilla extract
1 tsp almond extract
4-5 old bananas, mashed
3 c flour
1 tsp baking powder
½ c buttermilk
½ tsp baking soda

In a large mixing bowl, cream the sugar and butter. Add eggs, vanilla and almond extracts, and mashed bananas ~ mix well. •Pro-tip: mix between each addition

In a separate bowl, combine the flour and the baking powder. Add dry ingredients to the banana mixture in the larger bowl. Mix until combined.

In a separate bowl (at least a 2 cup bowl) combine buttermilk and baking soda; whisk until foamy. Add to the mixture and combine.

Lightly spray three loaf pans with non-stick spray* and pour the batter evenly into the three loaf pans. Bake at 325°F for 45 minutes or until a

toothpick inserted into the middle of the loaves comes out clean. <Every oven is a little different so be sure to watch the last 10 minutes or so. Remember: this recipe creates a loaf that is lighter in color so don't expect it to darken like usual banana bread.> Allow to cool in pans for 10 minutes before removing from pans and placing on cooling racks.

Old Fashioned Banana Bread (Summer's fave)-
—makes 2 loaves—

2 c sugar
1 c butter, softened (2 sticks)
4 eggs
6 old bananas, mashed (about 3 cups)
2 ½ c flour
2 tsp baking soda
1 tsp salt

Cream together sugar and butter in a large mixing bowl with an electric mixer until light and fluffy.

Add eggs, mix; add bananas and mix.

In a separate bowl, combine the flour, baking soda, and salt. Add dry ingredients to the banana mixture and mix just enough to combine. Don't overmix!

Lightly grease* two loaf pans and evenly pour the batter into the loaf pans. Bake at 350°F for 45 min to 1 hour until a toothpick inserted into the center of the loaf comes out clean and the edges begin to separate from the pans. Allow to cool in pans for 10 minutes before removing from pans and placing on cooling racks.

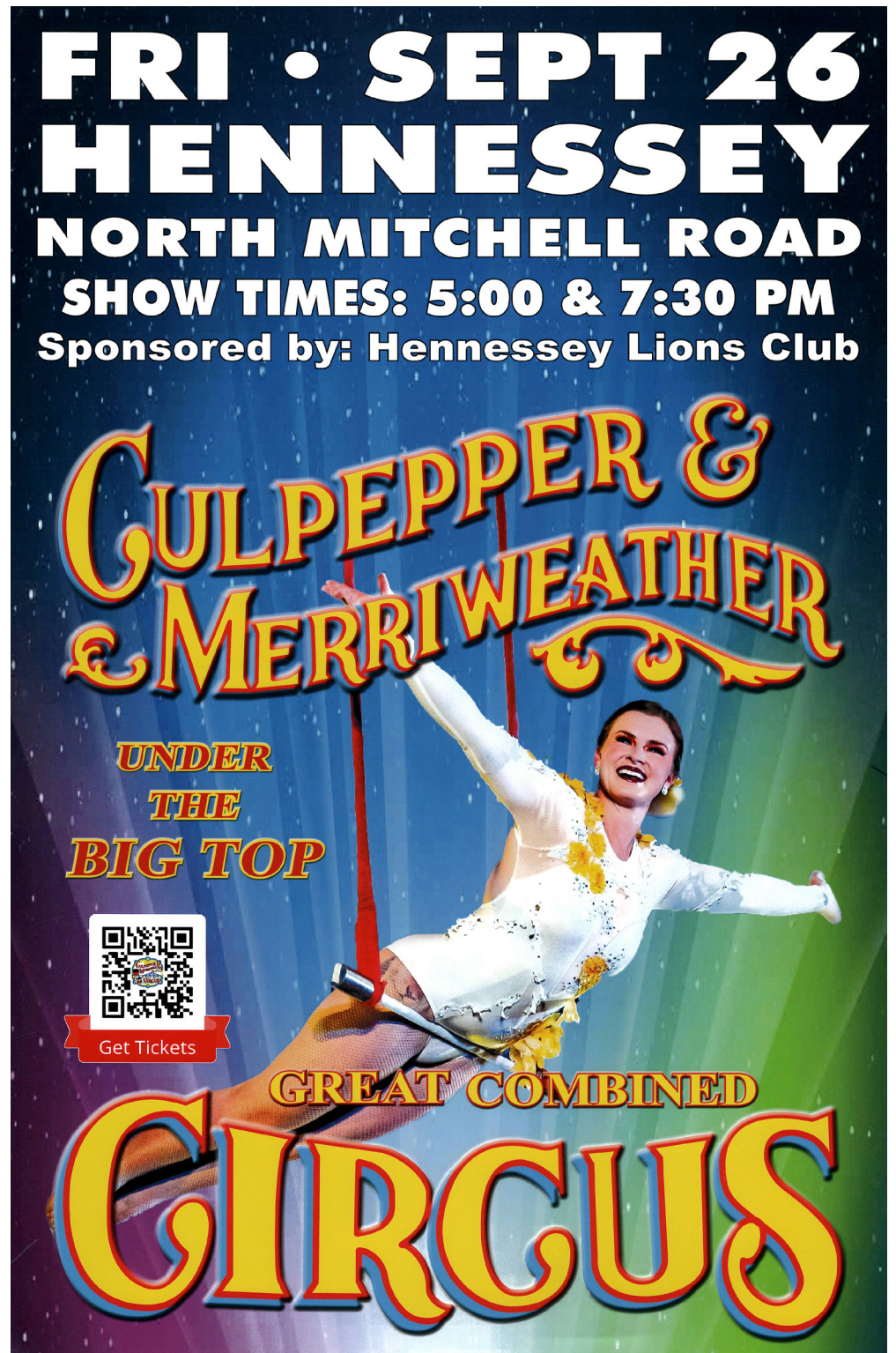

KINGFISHER LAW ENFORCEMENT AND FIRE RADIOS GO ENCRYPTED

All Kingfisher County law enforcement agencies, as well as Kingfisher Fire Department began encrypting their main radio frequency due to officer safety concerns.

Sheriff Aaron Pitts told All About Hennessey the change was prompted by individuals using scanners to post officers’ real-time locations and the call details on social media. One in particular is the Kingfisher OK Scanner Traffic Facebook page. Officials said this practice has jeopardized operations, such as suspect searches, by giving criminals “firsthand knowledge” of police movements. It has also increased risks at call scenes, making it harder for officers to safely do their jobs.

Encryption scrambles radio transmissions so only authorized radios can receive them. While the public once could listen with scanners, the new system prevents that access. All police departments in the county, including Kingfisher and Hennessey, are included in the initiative.

Kingfisher Fire Chief Ryan Gibson explained the move is also about protecting sensitive information. “We transmit patient data and sometimes the location of keys to access homes in emergencies,” he said. “We’re not trying to hide from the public.”

Ryan Deathridge, Director of 911 and Emergency Management, added that the 911 consoles and radios have been reprogrammed so all agencies can continue to communicate with each other. “This is a technical change,” he said. “It does not affect the way 911 or dispatchers operate.”

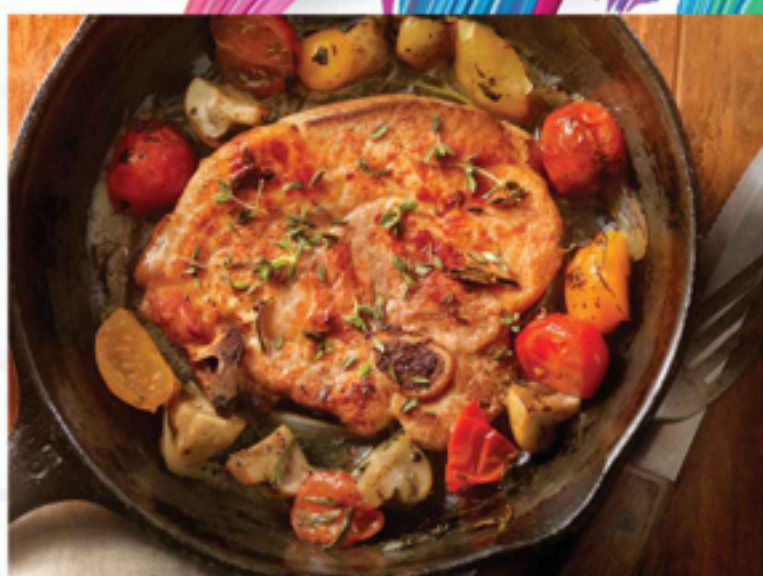
