Charlie Pickle was born in Oklahoma City but raised in the Dover-Hennessey area, on land homesteaded by his family. His parents, Bill and Marilyn Pickle, raised Charlie and his brother Ben on the family farm, with both crop and cattle operations. Bill also worked in pipelining and



Marilyn taught music at school and gave piano lessons to many area kids.

Charlie attended Dover Schools starting in kindergarten and graduating in 1979. After high school, he worked in the pipeline as a heavy equipment operator for Farrar Construction until 1995.

Charlie went to college as an adult student attending both Redlands Community College and Oklahoma State University studying Ag Communications and Political Science. He then completed his degree at Southern Nazarene University in Organization Leadership.

In 1995, he started a career in the telecommunications industry as a fiber optic engineer, eventually working primarily in Central and Northeastern Oklahoma. As an outside plant engineer and then director of outside plant operations for MBO Networks, a Mannford, OK company, Charlie was responsible for substantially all of the construction and maintenance of their fiber optic network from Oklahoma City to Northwest Arkansas to Kansas City, Missouri an accomplishment he is proud of to this day.

In 2014, after the death of his father, Charlie took over the day-to-day operations of the family farm, Prairie Hill Farms, which continues to have both crop and cattle operations. He eventually retired from MBO in 2016 and returned to the area in 2018 to again make his home on the family farm.

Charlie has been married to Alma since 2007 and has three children, Andy, Aryn, and Jesi. Jesi is a senior at Hennessey High School. Aryn and Andy live out of the

area in Chicago and Oologah, respectively.



Alma is retired from Advanced Workzone Services, a business she founded in 2005 along with two partners. Charlie, Alma, and Jesi are members of the Hennessey First Baptist Church.

From Dust to Digital: Why Small Town News Still Matters

In a world where news breaks on our phones before the morning coffee's done brewing, it's easy to wonder if the small-town newspaper still has a place. But here in Oklahoma, where stories travel just as fast



through the diner as they do through Facebook, local news still does something no algorithm ever could- it connects us.

A headline in the newspaper isn't just ink on paper; it's the heartbeat of a community. It's who won the show, whose grand-baby was born last week, and which team made it to state. It's the obituaries we read with tears in our eyes and the high school sports photo that make us cheer all over again.

Before social media, the local paper was how we stayed woven together. Even now, it still holds a kind of quiet power- one that doesn't depend on clicks, but on care. There's something grounding about holding a real newspaper in your hands, about seeing familiar names and faces in print. It's proof that our lives, our little towns, still matter enough to be remembered.

Local journalism may have traded typewriters for laptops, but the mission hasn't changed. It's still about telling the truth, celebrating community, and keeping the stories of our towns alive. Whether it's printed on paper or shared online doesn't matter because every small town deserves to see itself reflected.

So, as we scroll through the noise of the world, let's not forget the simple joy of flipping through those pages that smell faintly of ink. The small-town paper might not break the biggest stories, but it keeps the most important ones alive- ours.

Deatherage, who also serves on the Oklahoma State Board of Education, was reportedly absent from a recent board meeting. The KOCO report noted that he had called in sick for that meeting.

Deatherage gained attention earlier this year for his role on the state board during the controversy involving State Superintendent Ryan Walters, after investigators found that an R-rated movie had been played in Walters' office.

The Kingfisher County Commissioners confirmed Deatherage's resignation, saying, "Mr. Deatherage did resign from his position for personal reasons, and we wish him well."

The Hennessey Eagles put on a show Friday night, crushing the Bulldogs 49-8 in a game that showed off both their explosive offense and lockdown defense.

The Eagles set the tone early when Mario Lopez scooped up a fumble and returned it 34 yards for a touchdown. Brytan Gardner followed it up with a 3-yard run and a successful 2 point conversion, giving Hennessey an 8-0 lead after the first quarter.

Quarterback Levi Ferrell had an outstanding night, scoring on a 1-yard rush and throwing three touchdown passes, two to Gardner and one to Luis Macias-Montoya. Ferrell's command of the offense kept the Bulldogs on their heels all game long.

On the defensive side, the Eagles were nearly unbeatable. The defense shut down the Bulldogs' running game, forced turnovers, and didn't allow a single score until late in the third quarter. Ben Smith had a standout game defensively, with 8 tackles and a sack. Overall the defense swarmed to the ball, making big hits and stopping drives before they could start.

Alex Gonzalez added an 18-yard rushing touchdown, and Gardner sealed the win with a touchdown on a 2-yard run in the fourth quarter. With this statement win, the Eagles continue to prove they're a force to be reckoned with this season.

HENNESSEY NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY 2025



Sinclair Station

I don't know about you guys, but when I drive through my hometown, I see the buildings that hold so many memories. I



grew up in Hennessey, Oklahoma, and one of my favorite spots is the Sinclair Station on the south end of Main Street. It reminds me of the days I went there with my dad. He often took me to school, and to avoid getting there too early, I would ride along with him while he filled up his pickup for a day of checking wells. There may have been a soda and a handful of peanuts involved. I would mix the

peanuts through the opening of my soda bottle, enjoying the combination while keeping myself occupied.

This story actually goes back to when I would accompany my dad while checking wells. I would sit in my little chair on the tailgate, watching for snakes while Dad cleaned out cattle guards. I was also in charge of covering my ears when Dad had to start a stubborn hand-cranked pumping unit he called "Old Jose." He would tell me to cover my ears because he was pretty sure he'd have to sweet-talk her to get her going!

When started kindergarten, I didn't understand why I had to go to a place that requested an extra pair of underwear and made us take naps on mats. I was perfectly fine hanging out with my dad. My mom often entrusted him with my school drop-off, knowing I wouldn't resist as much.

Years later, I found myself going through a family treasure: an cookbook red my mom frequently used. The pages



were marked with notes and stains, telling stories of their own. My mom often said that the old cookbook kept us from starving. As I gently turned the pages, a gas receipt fell out a simple receipt from 1985, signed by my dad, which became a treasured keepsake.


I wanted to create a tribute to my memories of the Sinclair Station, and that



tribute came in the form of a gas can, brought to me by a family friend and my Sunday School teacher, Chuck Grimes. Although it wasn't from Sinclair, it still had a connection to me. It was from the Farmers Coop on the north end of Main Street, a place I've written about in some of my stories.

While some people share their memories in albums, I express mine through writing and painting. Selfishly, I hope my grandchildren will someday read this and catch a glimpse of a place and time I cherish. I have that gas can sitting in the corner of my living room, and it's definitely a conversation starter. Not far from the gas can hangs a painting of Old Jose. If I could paint the sound of her backfiring, I would!

I've often wondered why no one has written a song about the sounds and smells of the oil field. I was blessed to experience it firsthand and hope my parents knew I appreciated their sacrifices!

VOTER REGISTRATION DEADLINE APPROACHES

Friday, October 24, is the last day to apply for voter registration in order to be eligible to vote in November 18, Special Election: Kingfisher County, Kingfisher County Election Board Secretary Shawna Butts said today.

Shawna Butts said that persons who are United States Citizens, residents of Oklahoma, and at least 17 ½ years old are eligible to apply for voter registration. However, you must be at least 18 years old to vote.

Applications must be received by the County Election Board or postmarked no later than midnight, October 24. Applications postmarked after that time will be accepted, but will not be processed until after November 18, Special Election: Kingfisher County. Applications may also be submitted to any motor vehicle agency that is also an official voter registration agency by the submission deadline.

Applicants will be notified in writing when their application has been processed. Approved voters will receive a Voter Identification Card in the mail. Some may receive a letter that explains the reason or reasons the application was not approved. Shawna Butts said those who do not receive a response within 30 days of submitting their application should contact the County Election Board office immediately.

The Kingfisher County Election Board reminds voters that applications must be approved by the County Election Board Secretary in order to vote.

Registered voters who have moved to Kingfisher County from a different county or state will need to complete a new Voter Registration Application in order to be eligible for elections in Kingfisher County. If you have moved within the county and need to update your address, you may make changes online using the OK Voter Portal at oklahoma.gov/elections/ ovp or complete a Voter Registration Application.

Voter Registration Applications can be downloaded from the State Election Board website at oklahoma. gov/elections. You may also complete a form at your County Election Board. Most post offices, tag agencies, and public libraries have applications available upon request.

The Kingfisher County Election Board is located at 101 S Main St., Rm#8 and is open from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. For questions, please contact the Election Board at 405-375-3895 or kingfishercounty@elections.ok.gov.
