

SALES TAX RENEWAL

Kingfisher County Voters: Important Sales Tax Renewal Information There's been some confusion about the upcoming Kingfisher County sales tax vote on Tuesday, November 11th. After speaking with the Kingfisher County Election Board, several fire chiefs, and the County Commissioners who called for the election, the All About Network has confirmed this is not a new tax.

The ½-cent county sales tax began in 1991 and has been renewed every five years since. Voters are being asked to continue it again. If passed, the overall tax rate will stay the same, only how the money is divided will change.

Here's the proposed distribution of the tax: Road Resurfacing: Was 28% → Now 19% Fire Departments: Was 13% → Now 15% OSU Extension & 4-H: Was 8% → Now 7%

Free Fair: Was 6% → Now 3% Museum: Was 4% → Now 5%

Libraries (Kingfisher & Hennessey): Was 2% → Now 3%

Sheriff's Office: Was 15% → Now 10%

County 911: 9% (unchanged)

General Government: Was 15% → Now 7%

Jail Trust Authority: 22%

Before this tax was established, many county services struggled to operate. For example, many rural fire departments had outdated equipment and no funds for repairs or replacements. Since the tax was implemented, those departments have been able to modernize and lower their ISO ratings, which in turn reduces homeowners' insurance costs.

This tax renewal helps keep essential services running across Kingfisher County.


PRAYING FOR PAISLEY: A BIRTHDAY FULL OF HOPE

In July of 2024, ten-year-old Paisley went in for what was supposed to be a routine check-up with her doctor. But when her labs came back, her creatinine levels were dangerously high. Her doctor immediately told the family to take her to OU Children's Hospital for further testing.

On July 2, Paisley was admitted, and after several days of tests, doctors determined that her kidneys were no longer functioning properly. Her family was faced with a difficult decision to start her on dialysis.

Just a few weeks later, on July 26, Paisley had surgery to have a port inserted and began dialysis the next day.



Today, Paisley lives without kidneys. She continues dialysis three to four times each week depending on how her blood pressure holds up. On September 10, 2025, she was officially added to the kidney transplant list, and now the family waits for the call that will change everything.

Through it all, Paisley's strength has inspired everyone around her. She's faced every challenge with courage, faith, and a smile that brightens the room.

And this past Saturday, October 25, her community made sure she knew just how loved she is. Come rain or shine, about fifteen cars lined up for a special birthday parade to celebrate Paisley. Balloons, honking horns, and smiling faces filled the street as friends, family, and neighbors drove by to wish this brave girl a happy birthday.

Because of her health, Paisley couldn't have a traditional party with her friends, but the parade brought the celebration right to her doorstep.

MUSTANG DONATES SAFETY EQUIPMENT TO HENNESSEY FIRE DEPARTMENT



On Wednesday, October 22, members of the Hennessey Fire Department toured the Mustang Gas Plant located on E650 Road (Exxon Road) south of Hennessey. The visit included a walkthrough of the plant and its training facilities, followed by dinner hosted by Mustang.

During the event, Mustang presented the department with four, multi-gas monitors. These handheld devices simultaneously measure oxygen, carbon monoxide, hydrogen sulfide (H₂S), and combustible gases. The monitors are vital for ensuring safety in hazardous environments such as tanks, silos, and confined spaces, providing real-time air quality readings and alerting users through audible, visual, and vibration alarms when danger is detected.

Firefighters attending the tour included Terry Berkenbile, Dustin Grellner, Dustin Munroe, Cris Pribyl, Kyle Keeton, Tyson Copeland, Skylar McCall, Sergio Gomez, Randy Gregory, Levi Copeland, and Fire Chief Brandon Scott.

Chief Scott expressed his appreciation for the donation, saying, "These monitors will help protect our citizens as well as our firefighters, not only in the oil field but also in homes and businesses." Chair New Board Dillon Teresa explained the new structure for the center. Shannon Miller will serve as the single on-site lead, managing both administrative day-to-day operations under the direction budget the board determined

A large barn west of Hennessey was destroyed by fire Monday afternoon, October 20th.

The Hennessey Fire Department was dispatched around 2:30 p.m. to 11778 E. 630

Road, the property of Tom and Becky Holder. When crews arrived, the barn was already fully engulfed in flames. The wood-framed structure, covered in metal siding, had begun to collapse from the heat and intensity of the blaze.

It was determined the safest course of action was to allow the structure to burn down under controlled conditions rather than risk injury attempting to extinguish it. Thankfully, no animals were inside the barn at the time, and no injuries were reported.


Hennessey residents can grab their Mini Funnel Cakes at the local Golden Chick location through the holiday season and enjoy a dessert that gives back.

EXXON ROAD REOPENS

October 21, County Commissioner Mike Sparks announced that 650 Road (Exxon Road), from Mitchell Road to US Highway 81, would be temporarily closed for repairs. Thanks to the swift work of David Fuksa with F5 Construction, drainage improvements near Miller Heights on Exxon Road were completed ahead of schedule.

Next, the County will begin resurfacing the road by grinding the existing asphalt, relaying it, and applying a double chip and seal treatment. This work is part of a broader effort to improve several roads in the area.

EAGLES FLY HIGH WITH 21-8 VICTORY OVER LUTHER by AAH Cam Griffin

The Hennessey Eagles celebrated an impressive 21-8 win against Luther, thanks to strong performances on both offense and defense. The game began with a big play from Levi Ferrell, who intercepted a pass in his first game at safety. Ferrell quickly turned that momentum into points, rushing for a 10-yard touchdown to put the Eagles ahead 7-0.

Luther responded with a rushing touchdown and a two-point conversion, bringing the score to 7-8. But Ferrell wasn't done, alongside Mario Lopez, he led the team on a 10-play, 52-yard drive, scoring another touchdown on a 5-yard run, making it 13-8 after a missed PAT.

In the third quarter, Ferrell connected with Beau Vinson for a 12-yard touchdown pass and rushed in a two-point conversion, extending the lead to 21-8. The Hennessey defense stepped up, forcing turnovers and stopping the Lion offense with big sacks from Esteban Blanco and Luis Macias-Montoya.

Ferrell dominated the game with 155 rushing yards, 2 rushing touchdowns, and 1 passing touchdown, while Mario Lopez added 77 yards, capped with a crucial 36-yard rush to seal the victory. With the win, the Eagles extend their winning streak to 6 for the first time since the 2015 season, and secure their spot in the Playoffs!
