KINGFISHER COUNTY ASSESSOR HIGHLIGHTS KEY ISSUES FOR PROPERTY OWNERS

Kingfisher County Assessor Carrie Turner stopped by the All About Network studio Tuesday, March 3, to discuss three important topics affecting local property owners.

First, Turner addressed Senate Bill 841, currently being discussed at the State Capitol. The bill proposes eliminating property taxes for homeowners with a homestead exemption. While that may sound appealing, Turner said the impact locally could be significant.



In Kingfisher County alone, eliminating homestead property taxes could remove roughly \$5 million from local funding. Those dollars currently support schools, fire departments and EMS, county roads and equipment, the sheriff's office and jail, libraries, and other county services.

If the funding disappears, Turner said the revenue would have to be replaced, possibly through higher sales taxes or shifting more of the burden to businesses and rental property owners.

Turner also reminded residents that the Assessor's Office is conducting property inspections in Hennessey this year. State law requires every property in the county to be visually inspected once every four years. Assessor staff will be in marked vehicles, wearing identification badges and safety vests, and may be seen walking around properties, including backyards, to document structures.

Finally, Turner encouraged residents age 65 and older to check into a program that allows **Continued on page 3.**

For more than half a century, the Kingfisher County Retired Educators Association has provided a way for retired teachers and school support staff to remain connected while continuing to support education and their local

communities. The group brings together former educators from across Kingfisher County who share a commitment to public schools and to protecting the Oklahoma Teacher Retirement System.

The association meets several times throughout the year, typically gathering on the first Wednesday in September, November, January, March, and May. Meetings feature guest speakers who present on a variety of topics, including education, health, and local programs that affect the community. The gatherings also offer members a chance to reconnect with longtime colleagues, enjoy fellowship, and participate in lighthearted activities.

One of the organization's most important efforts is supporting future teachers. Each year, the group awards a \$500 scholarship to a Kingfisher County graduate who is pursuing a degree in education and has reached their junior or senior year of college. Scholarship recipients are selected based on academic achievement, campus involvement, and financial need when applicants are equally qualified. Funds may be used for classroom setup, certification test fees, or other education-related expenses.

Over the years, the scholarship program has supported a number of future educators from the area. Recent recipients include Grace Sinclair and Ashley Winans in 2025; TJ Parker and Tate Ott in 2024; Jaelle Farrell in 2023; Jill Newer in 2022; Kristina Walker and Dawson Leffingwell in 2021; Micah Mueggenborg and Ashten Evens in 2020; Kol Bomhoff in 2019; Caitlyn Stucki and Hailey Vaverka in 2018; Kristian Stitt in 2017; and Madison Russell in 2016.

Members of the Kingfisher County Retired Educators Association also stay active in community service projects throughout the year. The group delivers treats to local schools during National Education Week, contributes to Santa's Toyland to help provide gifts for children in need, and assists with the Kingfisher County Fine Arts Festival by judging contests, providing ribbons, and helping with event activities. Through their continued involvement and dedication, retired educators in Kingfisher County remain a strong support for public education and for the students and communities they served throughout their careers.

SENATE MINUTES WITH SENATOR CHUCK HALL | MARCH 6, 2026

The Senate is advancing a comprehensive package of foster care reforms this legislative session. These bills would provide more support for children in foster care and help recruit additional foster parents who can provide loving homes while the state works to reunite Oklahoma families.

Although Oklahoma has seen a steady decline in the number of children entering the system over the past decade, the need for foster families remains. Oklahoma DHS currently has 5,895 children in custody, 338 kids awaiting placement and 736 foster families needed. This issue hits close to home for me. My wife and I have been foster parents, and we've seen firsthand the difference a loving home can make in a child's life. This also isn't a partisan issue. It's an Oklahoma issue.

I introduced Senate Bill 1983 to help identify areas of need within the foster system. This would require the Department of Human Services to share non-identifying foster care data with private child-placement agencies that contract with the state. Under this legislation, DHS will be required to share the number of children without placements, demographic and geographic data on foster parents and children, and regional information on areas with high need and low availability of placements. Sharing

this data will help DHS and resource family partners work together to find suitable placements for children, ideally close to their home communities.

I also filed legislation to make transitions between placements easier for foster children. Senate Bill 1377 would create a program for DHS to provide duffel bags to foster children who don't have luggage for their belongings. Too often, kids are forced to carry everything they own in trash bags when moving between placements or returning home. These duffel bags would include hygiene products and other necessities. Several nonprofits and advocacy groups have already expressed interest in donating supplies.

Senate Pro Tem Lonnie Paxton is carrying legislation to allow foster children to voluntarily remain in foster care until age 21, ensuring the rug isn't pulled out from under them the moment they turn 18. The bill, which would help provide foster youth with more support as they transition into adulthood, was heard in the Senate Appropriations Committee this past week.

These foster care initiatives come at a time when the Trump administration is working to improve America's foster care system. Oklahoma was the first state to join the national A Home For Every Child initiative, which aims to reduce the number of children entering foster care, attract new foster parents, and improve foster parent retention. qualifying homeowners to freeze the taxable value of their home. To qualify, household income must be \$85,000 or less. The program freezes the assessed value of the home, not the total tax bill, which can still change depending on school levies or bond issues. Dyslexia and Me

A few weeks ago, I overheard an adult refer to someone as dyslexic. I'm not sure exactly how they meant the comment. I turned and said, "I'm dyslexic." The apology came quickly after that. It made me wonder how the comment was intended in the first place.



Since that moment, I've found myself thinking a lot about my 7-year-old self and how she might have felt hearing something like that. I'm not writing this for sympathy. I'm writing it so someone out there on the dyslexia spectrum knows they are not alone.

When I was 7, I had no idea what the word dyslexia meant. In fact, I never even heard the word until I was an adult advocating for my own child. I just knew reading was hard, and honestly, I

didn't enjoy it until I was probably in my 30s. School wasn't really my thing anyway. I wanted to go to work with my dad.

But when I got to first grade, things got really tough.

My sweet mom spent hours working with me. I still hate flash cards to this day. I could spell the words verbally, but when I wrote them down on the dreaded spelling tests, the letters would come out backwards. Because of that, I didn't pass a single spelling test that entire year.

I was so desperate to pass just one that I even tried cheating. Not only did I get caught and feel completely embarrassed, the words were still backwards anyway.

I can still tell you exactly where I was standing when my mom told me I would be repeating first grade.

That summer I went to tutors twice a week. Yes... more flash cards. They were retired teachers and such a blessing to both me and my mom.

When school started again, I spent an hour every day in a room not much bigger than a closet. I would load film into a projector, read a sentence, and then take a test. To be honest, I got pretty good at changing the film. Understanding the stories was another matter.

As the years went on, the anxiety around school grew. I felt dumb. I felt like I didn't fit inside the traditional box of learning.

Most teachers were wonderful. But there was one in sixth grade that I was moved away from after Christmas break. The tears I cried every afternoon after school told the story. That was the only time I ever remember my dad going to the school.

After I was moved out of that class, the teacher told the students it was because I wasn't smart enough to be there.

Luckily for him, Jack Funderberg got to my dad before he did. That day started a lifelong friendship between Jack and my family. Jack became one of my biggest cheerleaders.

Along the way, there were people who understood that I simply learned differently. One teacher hung my Clifford the Big Red Dog drawing on the bulletin board and wrote a note saying I was actually good at something. Another no-nonsense teacher welcomed me into her classroom and helped me find my way.

Years later, I understood even more when my own child went through a similar journey. Dyslexia seems to run in families. By that time, he was actually tested and diagnosed. Modifications were made. Tests were read to him. He had a teacher who believed that the most challenging children are often the most rewarding to teach. She helped both my child and me.

So here's something I want people to remember.



If your child writes letters backwards... struggles with left and right... or constantly puts their shoes on the wrong feet, they are not stupid and they are not lazy. They may simply learn differently.

And they need someone to advocate for them.

By the way, in that school picture from back then, I slept in those pink rollers the night before.

And I'm pretty proud of that little girl.

I'm also forever thankful for the people who stood in my corner during the journey.

FROSHMORE ACADEMIC TEAM FINISHES STRONG AT CHAMPIONSHIP


The Froshmore Academic Team proudly represented Hennessey High School at the championship tournament in El Reno after earning their spot by finishing among the top ten schools in their division.

The Bruner family has faced immense health challenges over the past few years.

Brent was diagnosed with ulcerative colitis at just 12 years old. For years, he endured constant pain that prevented him from attending traditional high school. After countless medications failed, doctors determined he would need three major surgeries to remove his colon and rebuild his digestive system. His first surgery took place in January 2025, and his final procedure was completed in January 2026. Just before this last surgery, Brent developed a serious intestinal blockage and had to be rushed by ambulance to Integris in Oklahoma City. Doctors successfully removed the blockage and completed his final surgery, giving the family hope that he may finally experience relief.

While Brent was still in the midst of surgeries and recovery, the family received another devastating blow. In June 2025, Mark was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer. He underwent a Whipple procedure at MD Anderson in Houston in August 2025 and continues to travel every three months for testing while receiving chemotherapy in Enid.

Through it all, Angela has worked full-time while caring for both Brent and Mark, managing hospital stays, treatments, and the day-to-day needs of the family. Their oldest son, Matthew, has also been a pillar of strength during this challenging time.

To support the Bruner family with medical bills and immediate expenses, the Hennessey CAT Team will host a fundraiser at the Hennessey Mercantile on Saturday, March 28, at 5:00 PM. Donations can be made at Community State Bank to CAT, with "Bruner Family" noted in the memo.

A special raffle is underway to help support the Bruner family, with a generous donation from Breckenridge Arms making it possible. Kenny at Breckenridge Arms has donated a beautiful Henry rifle that will be raffled as part of the fundraiser to benefit the Bruner family. Community members now have the opportunity to purchase raffle tickets for a chance to win the rifle while also helping a local family in need.

Tickets are available for \$10 each or three for \$25. Anyone interested in purchasing tickets can reach out to Jimmy Berkenbile at Eagle Propane and arrange a time to meet and pick them up.

Organizers say the raffle is a simple way for the community to come together and show support for the Bruner family. They also expressed their appreciation to Kenny and Breckenridge Arms for the generous donation that helped make the fundraiser possible.
