UNDERSTANDING HENNESSEY'S EMS FUNDING CHALLENGE

Hennessey residents will soon be asked to make an important decision about the future of emergency medical services in the community. The discussion centers on how to fund ambulance service long-term and why local leaders say the current funding model is no longer sustainable.

For the past 25 years, Life EMS provided ambulance service to Hennessey without significant rate increases. Following the retirement of the owner and the sale of the service to Mercy Regional EMS, the community is now facing the true market cost of providing emergency medical care.

Town officials say the existing city sales tax, which generates approximately \$16,000 to \$17,000 per month, is no longer enough to cover the cost of maintaining ambulance service.

The town entered into a temporary six-month agreement with Mercy Regional EMS to gather operational and financial data about the service. The agreement costs approximately \$26,000 per month, and officials note that even this amount is considered below market value. By comparison, nearby communities pay considerably more for similar services.

The challenge is not unique to Hennessey. EMS agencies across Oklahoma and the nation are dealing with rising equipment costs, staffing shortages, and increasing operating expenses.

Wheat harvest rolled into high gear last weekend, and by Sunday combines could be seen running in fields across the area. Northwest of Hennessey, however, one operator stood out from the crowd. Eleven-year-old Archer Huntsberger was hard at work behind the wheel of his own combine.

Archer, the son of Wayne and Amy Huntsberger, was harvesting wheat Sunday afternoon on the family farm northwest of Hennessey. While most kids his age are enjoying summer break, Archer was busy bringing in the family's crop.

A few years ago, family friend Brent Hajek purchased a new combine and gifted his 1981 International 1480 combine to Archer. The machine may be about 45 years old, but it has found a new life with its young owner. This is Archer's second season operating the combine.

According to his father, Wayne, the aging machine comes with its share of challenges. "It has normal 45-year-old combine issues," Wayne said with a laugh. "But the air conditioning is cold, and it's getting the job done." **continued on page 7**

cardiac monitor can cost around \$60,000, while the cost of medications, fuel, training, insurance, and vehicle maintenance continues to rise.

To address the funding shortfall, community leaders are proposing the creation of a 522 EMS District. The district would establish a property tax across the entire Hennessey School District, including portions of Garfield County. Supporters argue this would create a broader funding base because all property owners within the service area would contribute to ambulance operations, rather than relying solely on sales taxes collected within Hennessey city limits.

Officials estimate the proposed district would generate between \$200,000 and \$220,000 annually. However, they emphasize that the new tax alone would not fully fund ambulance operations. Instead, it would work alongside existing sales tax revenue to help cover annual staffing costs, which exceed \$400,000 before equipment, fuel, medications, and other expenses are considered.

Another key point in the discussion is the level of service Hennessey residents currently receive. The community is served by an Advanced Life Support (ALS) ambulance staffed with paramedic-level providers. Unlike basic ambulance services that primarily transport patients to a hospital, ALS crews can perform advanced medical procedures, administer critical medications, interpret cardiac rhythms, and provide life-saving care before reaching the emergency room.

If voters approve the district, county commissioners would appoint an independent EMS board to oversee the funds. That board would be responsible for seeking proposals from ambulance providers and selecting the service that best meets the community's needs and budget. The board would operate independently from the Hennessey Board of Trustees.

Local officials stress that even if the district is approved, it is only a first step. Many EMS leaders believe long-term solutions will require state and federal action, including recognizing EMS as an essential public service similar to police and fire protection.

During a town hall-style meeting hosted by All About Hennessey on May 26, several residents raised concerns about the fairness of the proposed funding method. Because the district would be funded through property taxes, renters would not directly pay the tax, while larger landowners would bear a greater share of the cost.

In a video discussion, All About Network owner Jack Quirk and Hennessey Fire Chief Brandon Scott also explored possible long-term funding alternatives that have been discussed in other areas, including utility-based fees and cellphone-related service fees. However, no such alternatives are currently available under Oklahoma law for local EMS funding.

For now, the upcoming vote represents a decision about how Hennessey will fund and maintain emergency medical care for years to come while balancing rising costs and the community's desire to maintain a high level of service.

The election will be held Tuesday, June 16. All registered voters living within the Hennessey School District are eligible to vote.

PAVEMENT TRAIN

Highway 81 south of Dover is undergoing resurfacing work and, at least for now, the project should wrap up this week.

Matt Mitchell, P.E., ODOT Division Engineer for District 4, said the project includes a hot in-place recycle (HIR) treatment followed by a 1-inch asphalt overlay designed to improve the driving surface and extend the life of the pavement.

The process uses a specialized "pavement train" that completes an entire lane in a single pass. The equipment superheats the existing asphalt, recycles it, and places it back on the roadway as it moves forward.

The contractor, Haskell Lemon Construction Co. of Oklahoma City, is performing the HIR work. The rehabilitation process reheats and reuses a portion of the existing pavement, reducing material waste and construction costs while improving ride quality.

Weather permitting, contractors expect to complete the HIR portion of the project within the next few days. The asphalt overlay is currently scheduled for mid-June, allowing approximately two weeks for the recycled pavement to cure and stabilize before the final surface layer is applied.

Once the overlay is finished, crews will mill new edge-line rumble strips and install final pavement striping. The project is expected to be substantially complete in early July, weather permitting.

PLAN AHEAD IF GOING EAST OF KINGFISHER

If you travel Highway 33 east of Kingfisher, get ready for some delays.

Construction crews are scheduled to begin a major highway improvement project on Monday, June 2. The project will cover more than nine miles of Highway 33, starting just east of the U.S. 81 intersection in Kingfisher and continuing east to approximately N2940 Road.

The work will include widening the highway, adding shoulders, and resurfacing the roadway. According to the Oklahoma Department of Transportation (ODOT), these improvements are designed to make the highway safer and improve traffic flow.

Crews have already started setting up signs and traffic cones and have moved equipment into place in preparation for construction.

Traffic will remain open in both directions during the project, but drivers should expect lane shifts, narrower lanes, reduced speeds, and occasional delays as work continues.

One day a week I let everyone know it's my day. I don't do appointments and hardly answer my phone this day. I pack a lunch so I can spend every minute soaking up painting! I walk into a room filled with canvas and paint. We leave the world outside for a few hours each week. I go to my happy place and get to hang out with a couple of amazing artists. These two bring their own styles to the room. They are willing to share their tips and tricks with me. When they critique my work I always appreciate the honesty, the advice and just talking art with them.

I have done pencil drawings and focused on portraits. I found my subjects on the sidelines at sporting events. I'd take pictures for the kids. It was a win win — the kids got the pictures and I had reference photos to draw. This introduced me to some amazing young people! A lot of them have a portrait of their high school days as a memory.

As my art journey has evolved I have opened myself up to new challenges and mediums. This is where my artsy friends enter my journey. Rose and Terri are both very accomplished artists. They

are both country girls that happen to love to paint. Boy have they taught this city girl a thing or two.

I have always kept my distance from horses. Probably from a childhood experience that traumatized me. I think they are beautiful animals. As far as painting them, I have always been under the impression they were one of the hardest subjects to paint. My artsy friends face the challenge one brush stroke at a time. They each have different techniques. For example, we tease Rose about using the smallest brush she can find. I have watched her work hours on painting tiny details. She focuses on putting each hair on the horse in perspective. Terri is our color mixer. She will spend hours mixing colors to get just the right shade for shadows.

For me, I get told to slow down. I have a tendency to jump ahead and want to add details before undertones. Painting with oils makes me slow down, but we all have our favorite medium additives. Mine are the ones that make my paint dry faster.

The one thing I have noticed is that my horse anatomy is very elementary. Of course I know what the head and tail are on a horse, but when my two artsy friends start referring to withers and fetlocks I get lost! I was proud of myself knowing each horse in Terri's herd has four legs! This city girl finally had to ask the experts — what is a wither? Sometimes I get the feeling they don't know what they are going to do with the city girl!

Our conversations shift back and forth between horse anatomy and horse colors. I'm stuck on bay colored horses. I thought they were black, brown and even both. I have yet to attempt painting a horse! Sounds like I have more to learn! For now I love being in my own real life painting class and not watching it on tv.

COMING HOME: A RURAL ATTORNEY FINDING PURPOSE BACK IN KINGFISHER COUNTY

In a recent episode of The All About Show, we sat down with Kale Hajek of Harrison Mecklenburg Attorneys at Law to talk about his journey from a small-town upbringing to building a legal career back home in Kingfisher County.



Raised in Hennessey on a family farm, Hajek shared how growing up in rural Oklahoma shaped his values and eventually influenced his decision to return to the area after years spent in larger cities.

After graduating from Oklahoma State University with a degree in mathematics, Hajek initially pursued work in finance before deciding to attend law school at the University of Oklahoma. He later gained experience working for the Oklahoma Court of Civil Appeals and an oil and gas litigation firm in Oklahoma City before ultimately finding his way back to western Oklahoma.

Throughout the conversation, Hajek discussed the growing need for attorneys in rural communities and how he wanted to build a career where he could directly see the impact of his work. That desire, combined with family roots and the opportunity to raise his own family closer to home, led him to join Harrison Mecklenburg in Kingfisher.

Today, his practice primarily focuses on property, business, and oil and gas matters, while continuing to build relationships throughout the community.

For Hajek, the move back home was about more than a career path. It was about returning to the kind of community that helped shape him and finding a way to give back.

The young farmer has already shown a willingness to give back. Last year, after heavy rains delayed Brent Hajek's harvest, Archer loaded up his combine and headed to Ames to help bring in Hajek's wheat crop.
