HENNESSEY TRUSTEE RECOGNIZE VACANCIES OF JONES AND SHAW, DELAY DECISION ON REAPPOINTMENTS

Tuesday night, June 9, the Hennessey Board of Trustees formally recognized the vacancies of two trustee seats previously held by David Jones and Harold Shaw with a large audience in the council room.

The action stems from Oklahoma State Statute 11 O.S. §8-108, which states that a member of a municipal governing body automatically ceases to hold office if they are absent from more than one-half of all regular and special meetings held during any four consecutive month period.

Prior to the board's action, several residents spoke during citizen comments in support of Jones and Shaw, urging the board to consider reinstating them and questioning whether adequate notice had been provided for some meetings.

Others expressed concern that removing the trustees could create division within the community.

Town Attorney Jared Harrison explained that the law is not optional and that once the attendance threshold is exceeded, the office is considered vacant by operation of state law. He told the board that the purpose of Tuesday's action was to formally recognize what had already occurred under statute and to begin the process of filling the vacancies. Harrison also noted that neither Jones nor Shaw is prohibited from being appointed back to the board.

The board unanimously voted to recognize the vacancy of Jones' seat and then

unanimously voted to recognize the vacancy of Shaw's seat.

Both former trustees addressed the board and audience.

Jones requested reinstatement, citing examples of former trustees whom he believed had missed multiple meetings



without losing their positions. He said he was not disputing the attendance law but asked the board to consider restoring him to the seat. Jones also questioned whether a special meeting that contributed to his attendance count had originally been presented as a planning meeting.

Shaw said some of his absences were related to medical issues, including a heart attack and his wife's surgery. He encouraged the town to review how meetings are scheduled and communicated in the future.

Mayor Randy Bohnstedt said attendance is one of the fundamental responsibilities of an elected official and expressed concern that there had been little communication

when meetings were missed. He said board members are elected to represent the public and have a duty to attend meetings or notify others when they cannot be present.

When discussion turned to filling the vacant seats, several residents urged the board to immediately reappoint Jones and Shaw, arguing that voters had elected them and that the board should give them a second chance. However, Bohnstedt said he was not prepared to make appointments that night. Trustee Bert Gritz agreed, stating he wanted additional time and information before making a decision.

During the discussion, Harrison noted a potential complication involving the timing of Shaw's vacancy. Because the attendance threshold may have been exceeded more than 60 days ago, the town may need to determine whether a special election rather than an appointment is required under state law. Harrison said he would review the statute further before the next meeting.

Harrison stated he believes Jones could be reinstated because his absence is inside the 60-day window, but wanted to do more research.

The board ultimately tabled discussion of filling the vacant seats until its July meeting, leaving both positions vacant for the time being.

GOING BACK TOGETHER

The South Mitchell Road reconstruction project is moving along quickly as crews transition from demolition to rebuilding.

Over the past several weeks, contractors have removed the existing roadway, excavating the roadbed down to the dirt. With that phase complete, work has now shifted to rebuilding the roadway from the ground up.

Rickey Owens, engineer with The Cowan Group, said crews are currently installing geogrid, a mesh reinforcement material designed to stabilize the aggregate base and improve the road's long-term

durability. A GPS-guided grading system is also being used to precisely spread and shape the gravel base.

All of the aggregate material for the project is being supplied by Lightle's Sand & Construction in Hennessey and hauled to the site by Dollar Trucking.

When completed, the roadway will consist of six inches of aggregate base, six inches of S3 asphalt, and a final two-inch layer of S4 asphalt. Owens explained that the higher the asphalt mix designation, the smoother the finished driving surface.

Because South Mitchell Road carries a significant amount of heavy truck traffic, the project is being constructed to Oklahoma Department of Transportation (ODOT) specifications to ensure it can withstand the increased load and provide a longer service life.

The current phase of construction is expected to be completed within the next few weeks. The final one-third of the roadway will be reconstructed when additional grant funding becomes available, which should occur in the near future.

HENNESSEY PLANS FIRST ANNUAL FREEDOM FEST CELEBRATION JULY 2

Residents will have a new way to celebrate Independence Day this summer as the Town of Hennessey prepares for its first annual **Freedom Fest on Thursday, July 2.**

The community event will feature a parade, family activities, games, vendors, food, inflatables, contests, and entertainment at the Hennessey High School football practice field.

Activities will begin at 6 p.m., with a community parade scheduled to line up at 7 p.m. at the Christian Church parking lot. The parade will begin at 7:30 p.m. and travel through town before ending near the Freedom Fest activities.

Organizers have planned a variety of attractions for families and children throughout the evening. Several inflatable water slides and activities will be available, along with face painting, balloon animals, cornhole, horseshoes, tug-of-war, sack races, bubble activities, water games, and a special children's play area designed for younger participants.

A hot dog eating contest is also planned and will feature three age divisions. The Mini Mustard division will be open to younger children, the Relish Rookies division will include older youth and teenagers, and the Grill Masters division will be open to adults.

In addition to the activities, local organizations and businesses will be participating throughout the event. The Hennessey Police Department, Kingfisher County Sheriff's Office, Masonic Lodge, Lions Club, and numerous community volunteers are helping make the celebration possible.

The Masonic Lodge has sponsored the return of clown entertainment, including balloon animals and appearances throughout the evening. The Kingfisher County Sheriff's Office will bring its DUI obstacle course, while the fire department has volunteered to assist with water activities.

Several local vendors will also be on hand offering merchandise, refreshments, and treats. Planned vendors include Hennessey Nutrition, Sparky's, Black Diamond, jewelry vendors, snow cones, and other local businesses.

Free hot dogs, bottled water, and watermelon will be available during the event while supplies last, thanks to donations and community support.

A selfie wall contest is also planned, giving attendees an opportunity to submit photos taken during the event for a chance to win prizes donated by local businesses.

Organizers are still seeking volunteers, parade entries, and additional participants. Businesses, organizations, churches, clubs, and individuals interested in entering the parade, sponsoring an activity, operating a booth, or volunteering during the event are encouraged to get involved.

Organizer Shelley Burch stated, "Freedom Fest was created to provide an affordable, family-friendly celebration."

Additional event information, parade registration details, and volunteer opportunities will be announced as plans are finalized.

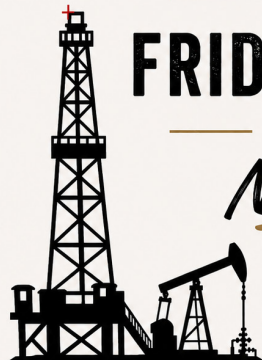

EARLY VOTING FOR JUNE 16TH PRIMARY ELECTION

In-person absentee voting (also known as "early voting") for the June 16 Election begins Thursday across the state. **Early voting locations will be open Thursday, June 11 and Friday, June 12 (8 a.m. to 6 p.m.) and Saturday, June 13 (8 a.m. – 2 p.m.)**

State Election Board Secretary Paul Zirix announced that, "In honor of America's 250th birthday, limited-edition 'I Voted' stickers will be available at early voting locations and polling places across the state, while supplies last." There are two different designs. A preview of the designs can be found on the State Election Board website.

CLOSED PRIMARIES

Voters are reminded that Oklahoma has closed primaries. For 2026, in order to participate in a party's primary election, you must be a registered voter of that party. More information about primary elections is available on the State Election Board website.

INDEPENDENT VOTERS

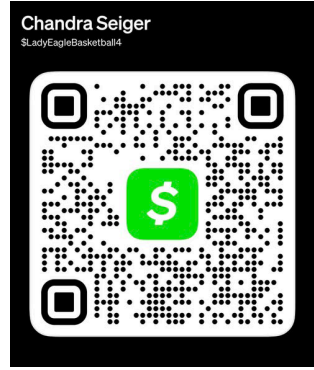
While the June Election includes party primary elections – **all registered voters in Oklahoma (including Independents) are eligible to vote on State Question 832.** Independents may also vote in any nonpartisan elections on the ballot such as for district judge and local propositions. You do not need to participate in a party's primary election in order to vote on the State Question or participate in nonpartisan elections or local elections.

ELECTION INFORMATION

A list of early voting locations is available on the State Election Board website, along with the list of elections. (Voters must vote in the county where they are registered to vote.) Sample ballots can be viewed and downloaded by logging into the OK Voter Portal.

Uncovering the Forgotten Cemetery of Paris, Oklahoma

Most of us know exactly where our loved ones are buried. We visit on holidays, leave flowers, and share stories. We take comfort in knowing where they rest and trust that future generations will remember.

But southwest of Hennessey, hidden in a pasture on the Hobbs family ranch, sits a cemetery where many of those answers have been lost to time.

On this episode of *We're Going In*, we explore the remains of a forgotten community known as Paris, Oklahoma.

Today, only three visible grave markers remain standing in a field. Yet local historians and family members believe many more people may be buried there.

"My grandparents lived here, and they moved here in 1917," said Michael Hobbs. "His father purchased this place in 1906. This is what we call the ranch."

According to property records, one acre of land was deeded for a church and another acre for a cemetery. Those small parcels are among the few surviving reminders of a once-thriving community.

According to historians, the town of Paris was settled by formerly enslaved African Americans who came from Paris, Texas. Like many all-Black communities established after the Civil War, it offered residents an opportunity to build lives, homes, churches, and schools of their own.

"There was a community there," said Kim Hobbs. "They were freed slaves from Paris, Texas, so they called their community Paris."

Over time, however, the town disappeared.

The buildings vanished. Families moved away. The cemetery faded from memory.

About 40 years ago, Kim Hobbs noticed something unusual while horseback riding across the property. "It had just rained," he recalled. "You could clearly see where these coffins had sunken in. There was a puddle of water beside one,

then another, then another all the way down the fence line."

The discovery suggested that many more graves existed than the few visible headstones indicated.

Recent cleanup efforts have revealed additional clues. Hobbs family members uncovered broken grave markers belonging to a minister and his wife. Researchers have also identified evidence that a Buffalo Soldier, a member of the historic African American cavalry units of the U.S. Army, may be buried there.

The findings attracted the attention of historians and archaeologists, eventually

bringing researchers from Langston University, the University of Oklahoma, and the Oklahoma Archaeological Survey to the site.

"We were contacted about this incredible resource that the Hobbs family has been protecting," said Kary Stackelbeck of the University of Oklahoma. "It's an old Black township known as Paris."

Researcher Dr. John Winters of

buried objects.

The second system, mounted on what looks remarkably like a lawn mower, uses ground-penetrating radar to send signals into the earth and measure what lies below.

"The radar can tell us if a coffin is present and how deep it is," explained archaeologist Scott Hammerstedt. "Sometimes there's something there, sometimes there isn't. You can never tell with these old cemeteries."

The data collected in the field will now be processed using specialized software at the University of Oklahoma.

Researchers hope the results will provide a clearer picture of how many people are buried there and help preserve an important piece of Oklahoma history.

For the Hobbs family and those involved in the project, the effort is about more than archaeology. It's about remembrance.

"I don't know that I can reach out to every family," Kim Hobbs said. But just to know how many people are there, we'll look after them as long as I have anything to do with it."

Soon, researchers may finally answer a question that has lingered for generations. Just how many people are buried in the forgotten cemetery of Paris, Oklahoma?

And perhaps, in doing so, help ensure they are forgotten no more.

Hennessey Graduate Becomes First President of New OSU Real Estate Club

A Hennessey High School graduate is helping shape the future of real estate education at Oklahoma State University while building his own career in the industry.

Kason Copeland, a 2024 graduate of Hennessey High School, recently became the first president of Oklahoma State University's newly formed Residential Real Estate Club. The organization was created alongside OSU's new Real Estate and Property Management degree program, the first of its kind in Oklahoma.

Copeland's journey into real estate wasn't part of his original plan.

"When I first went to OSU, I planned to become an agricultural attorney," Copeland said. "But after looking into it, seven years of school seemed like a lot. I started exploring other options and eventually found real estate."

His interest in real estate grew while attending OSU. Originally majoring in marketing, Copeland quickly switched majors when the university announced the new real estate program.

"I told my advisor to put me on the list immediately," he said. "As soon as the program became available, I made the switch."

While pursuing his degree, Copeland also earned his Oklahoma real estate license. After completing the required 90 hours of coursework and passing the state exam,



he joined the team at Lippard Real Estate & Auction, working under broker Troy Lippard. He has been with the company since January and recently assisted his first homebuyer through a successful purchase.

His involvement with the new OSU Real Estate Club came almost by accident.

When university officials began discussing

the creation of the organization, they quickly discovered they had plenty of interested students but few who knew how to organize the group. Encouraged by one of his professors, Copeland stepped forward to help.

"Nobody really knew where to start," he said. "I was one of the only students in the program who already had a real estate license, so they asked me to get involved."

The result was Copeland being elected as the club's first president.

The club's mission is to expose students to the many career paths available in real estate beyond simply buying and selling homes. Through guest speakers and networking opportunities, members will learn about development, investing, title work, property management, legal services, and other related fields.

Now entering his junior year, Copeland is on track to graduate from OSU in the fall of 2027, potentially a semester early thanks to college credits earned while attending Hennessey High School.

For now, he plans to continue building his real estate career while helping fellow students discover their own paths in the industry.

"I love the negotiation side of it, the people side of it, and the fact that it's always changing," Copeland said. "That's what makes real estate exciting."

Hennessey School Board Approves Contracts, Teacher Hire and Salary Schedule

The Hennessey Board of Education met Monday, June 8, approving annual contracts, reviewing district projects, discussing energy financing, and filling a teaching vacancy for the upcoming school year.

Board members unanimously approved the consent agenda, which included annual vendor contracts and routine district business. Superintendent Jason Sternberger noted that property and health insurance costs through Oklahoma Schools Insurance Group showed a slight decrease after several years of increases.

Sternberger updated the board on facility improvements, including repairs to a long-standing leak near the elementary special education classrooms caused by a settled drain component. He also reported the removal of a Bradford pear tree near the lower elementary building. Another nearby tree is being evaluated because its roots may be contributing to a musty odor in the elementary gymnasium and potentially affecting the building's foundation.

The board discussed paying off the district's Ideal Impact energy savings project early. The current balance is approximately \$271,000, but an early payoff using building fund resources could reduce that amount to around \$230,000 and save the general fund an estimated \$55,000 to \$60,000 annually.

The board accepted the resignation of second-grade teacher Becky Hood and approved Kenzie Martin as her replacement. Members also approved the district's 2026-2027 salary schedules.

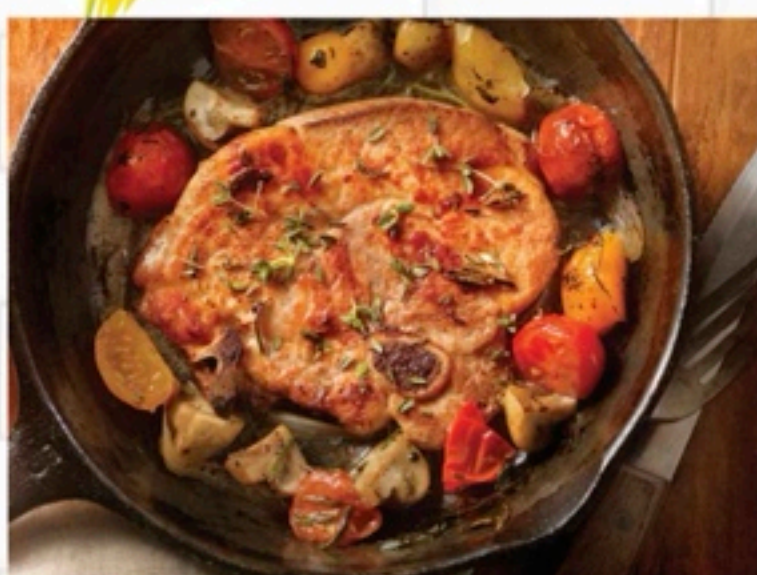

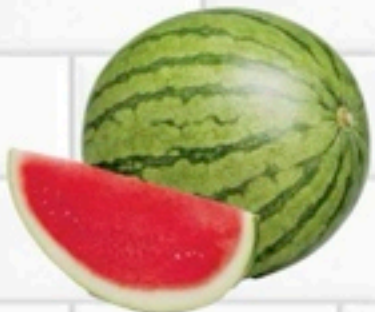
