522 Ambulance Board Lays Groundwork for New EMS District

The Hennessey 522 Ambulance District Board continued laying the foundation for the community's new ambulance district during its second meeting on Wednesday, July 29, taking several important steps toward becoming fully operational.

The district was approved by Hennessey voters in June after months of discussion about creating a dedicated funding source to help ensure long-term ambulance service for the community. The new 3-mill property tax district will begin collecting revenue in January 2027, providing a stable source of funding to help support local emergency medical services.

With all five board members present, the board focused less on ambulance operations and more on establishing the legal and financial framework needed before the district can begin managing the tax revenue approved by voters earlier this year.

Before the meeting began, members and guests enjoyed pizza provided by the Hennessey Round-Up Club.

One of the board's first actions was approving the hiring of attorney Jana Knott of Bass Law in El Reno to serve as the district's legal counsel. Knott will assist the board in drafting bylaws, preparing contracts, ensuring compliance with the Oklahoma Open Meeting Act, and helping establish the district as a legal entity.

Board member Dr. David Matousek told the board he contacted several law firms before Knott was recommended for this type of work.

Board member Levi Copeland said several key items cannot move forward until those legal steps are completed. The district must first establish its official legal name, obtain a Federal Employer Identification Number (FEIN), designate a physical address, and secure liability bonding before it can open a bank account or begin conducting financial business.

A major challenge facing the board is that it will not begin receiving tax revenue until January 2027, yet it will incur startup expenses before then, including attorney fees and other organizational costs.

The board also began discussing a formal agreement with the Town of Hennessey that will govern how 522 ambulance tax revenue is distributed. Because the town currently operates under one-year contracts, board members agreed the district's agreement should follow the same annual timeline.

Much of the evening's discussion centered on the district's future ambulance service contract. Mercy Regional EMS is currently providing ambulance service under a temporary six-month agreement with the Town of Hennessey while the new district becomes established. Once that agreement expires, board members believe the district will likely be required to seek competitive bids for future ambulance service.

Rather than simply accepting bids based on cost alone, the board plans to develop detailed service specifications that every bidder must meet. Those requirements could include Advanced Life Support (ALS) service, 24-hour emergency coverage, and a

backup ambulance capable of responding whenever the primary unit is out of the district transporting a patient.

Board members also discussed retaining a portion of future tax revenue during the district's first year to cover startup expenses, including legal fees, accounting services, insurance, bonding, and other administrative costs, before distributing the remaining funds to the ambulance provider.

The board also reviewed how 911 calls are routed, particularly near county lines where cellular calls can occasionally be directed to the wrong dispatch center before being transferred. Members stressed the importance of maintaining mutual aid agreements with neighboring ambulance services while ensuring Hennessey's ambulance remains available to serve local residents whenever possible.

Members reaffirmed their previous decision to hire the accounting firm of Storm & Hauser to prepare the district's first budget, which is expected to be completed by mid-August. The board must submit its proposed budget by Sept. 1.

Action on developing a long-term ambulance service contract was tabled until Knott has an opportunity to review the district's legal requirements and advise the board on the proper contracting process.

The board expects to hold another meeting later this month after consulting with legal counsel. At that time, work on the district's bylaws, contracts, and organizational structure will continue.

Officer Luis Rojo Completes D.A.R.E. Instructor Training

Hennessey Police Officer Luis Rojo completed the D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) instructor program on July 24, becoming one of approximately 100 active D.A.R.E. officers in Oklahoma. Rojo joins Hennessey Police Chief Christian Solis and Kingfisher County Sheriff Aaron Pitts as the only D.A.R.E.-certified law enforcement officers currently serving in Kingfisher County.

While many people remember D.A.R.E. as a program focused mainly on drugs, Chief Solis said today's curriculum is much different. The program now centers on helping students make good decisions, understand the consequences of their choices, solve problems, and handle peer pressure with confidence.

One of the biggest focuses is on fifth graders as they prepare to move into middle school and begin facing more independence and new social pressures. Rather than relying on scare tactics, D.A.R.E. teaches students practical decision-making skills they can use every day.

Solis said the program also gives students age-appropriate ways to say no without feeling like they have to give up friendships. The goal is to help kids build confidence while making choices that are right for them.

"As law enforcement, we often think our job is catching bad guys," Solis said. "But if we can help create fewer bad guys by making a positive impact on kids now, we'll have a better society in the future."

With his training complete, Officer Rojo will begin bringing the updated D.A.R.E. program into local classrooms, helping Hennessey students develop the decision-making skills they'll use well beyond their school years.



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Kingfisher County Residents Gain Free Access to Nation's First Community Access Portal Program

The Kingfisher Memorial Library made history on Thursday, July 30, as state leaders, local officials and community members celebrated the launch of the nation's first Community Access Portal Program, an innovative effort to bring healthcare, education and workforce services to rural Oklahoma.

The two private portal pods are the first installed as part of the Oklahoma Broadband Office's \$14.5 million initiative to place

up to 175 Community Access Portals in libraries across the state. The service is free to the public and available to all Kingfisher County residents. One pod is designed for individual use, while the second is ADA-accessible and can accommodate groups of up to five people.

"This is not only a special day for Kingfisher and Oklahoma, but for the nation," said Oklahoma Broadband Office Executive Director Mike Sanders. "This is the first technology of its kind in the United States, and we're doing it right here in Kingfisher."

Sanders said broadband is about more than internet access. "It's about connecting people with opportunities," he said. The portals will allow residents to attend virtual healthcare appointments, mental health counseling, job interviews, workforce training, online college classes, government services and meetings with attorneys or financial advisors without traveling to larger cities.

Library Director Michael Tautkus said the portals provide a secure, private space for services many residents already seek at the library.

The technology, developed by California-based Ready.net, features 4K video, studio-quality audio, soundproofing and frosted glass for privacy. CEO Jase Wilson said the portals were designed to give rural residents access to professional services while keeping all conversations private.

Kingfisher is the first of many Oklahoma communities scheduled to receive the portals. The ceremony concluded with a ribbon cutting officially opening the Community Access Portals to the public.

EPA BEGINS ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW OF DHA ENTERPRISES SITE NEAR HENNESSEY

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has opened an Administrative Record for the DHA Enterprises site near Hennessey as part of a federal environmental review. While the EPA document does not list the property's address, DHA Enterprises has previously been identified as the marijuana grow facility at 6925 U.S. Highway 81, just south of Hennessey.

An Administrative Record is a collection of documents the EPA uses when deciding what action, if any, should be taken at a site. In this case, the record is for what the EPA calls a removal action, which is used when the agency is investigating an environmental problem that may need a quicker response.

At this time, the EPA has not said what contamination may be at the site. The documents released so far also do not say that cleanup has started or been completed. Instead, they show that the EPA is gathering reports, work plans, and other records as it reviews the property.

The Administrative Record is open to the public and can be reviewed at the Hennessey Public Library, the Oklahoma Department of Environmental Quality, and the EPA Region 6 office. The EPA says additional documents may be added as work on the site continues.

COMMUNITY RALLIES IN SUPPORT OF AUBREY CHENEY'S FAMILY

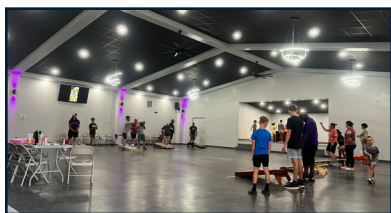
Community members came together in a remarkable show of support during a fundraiser held in honor of Aubrey Cheney, who recently lost her courageous battle with glioblastoma.

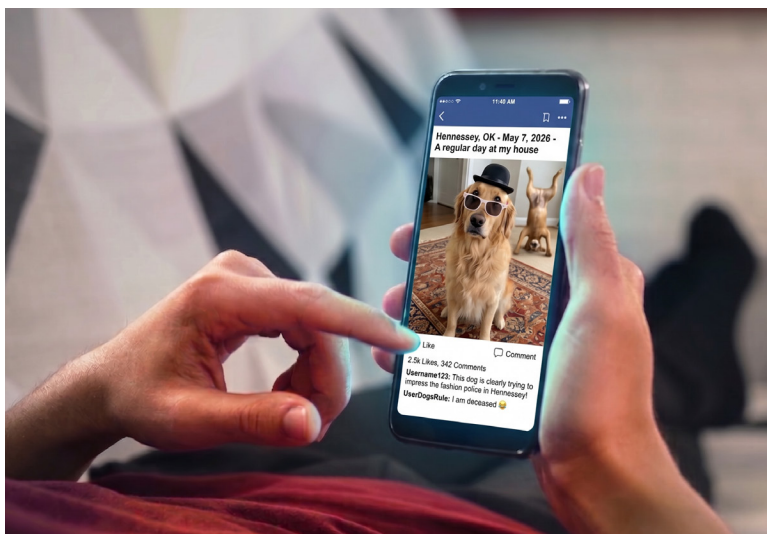
Blink and It's Gone: Creating Content That Holds Attention

Understanding how social media algorithms work is one thing. Creating content that actually performs within them is another. The difference often comes down to how your content looks, feels, and captures attention in the first few seconds. You are competing with everything from day-in-the-life videos and funny dog clips to attention-grabbing AI content, so the bar for attention is high.

Today, people scroll quickly. Attention spans are short, and the thumb is even faster. Stop-worthy content does not have to be overly designed or complicated. It needs a strong opening, clear visuals, and a format that is easy to consume. Movement, whether through video, transitions, or simple animation, plays a big role in holding attention. If it feels static, it usually gets treated that way. The barrier to creating good content is lower than it has ever been. The difference now is how you use what is available. Tools like Canva and Adobe Express make it easy to build clean graphics and simple videos without advanced design experience. For video content, platforms like CapCut, Instagram Edits, iMovie, and TikTok's built-in editor allow you to quickly add captions, trim clips, and follow styles audiences are already engaging with. For more control, tools like Adobe Creative Cloud, DaVinci Resolve, or Final Cut Pro offer deeper customization. AI-powered tools can also help generate ideas and speed up production, but they work best as support. Overusing AI-generated content can lead to content that feels generic and easy to scroll past.

Simple, clear content will often outperform something overproduced. Speed and consistency matter just as much as creativity. The brands that win are the ones that keep showing up. At the end of the day, content is competing for attention. Most people are not expecting a Super Bowl commercial. They are deciding in seconds what is worth their time. The goal is to create something worth stopping for.

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LADY EAGLES READY TO SOAR INTO PROMISING 2026 SEASON

There is a different feeling surrounding Hennessey Lady Eagle Softball this fall.

After posting the program's best win-loss record since before 2011 last season, expectations are climbing in Hennessey. More importantly, so is the belief. With a strong core of experienced returners, an exceptionally talented freshman class, and a coaching staff focused on building a lasting culture, the Lady Eagles appear poised for what could become the most successful season in recent program history.

Leading the returning group are seniors Clare Munroe and Kelie Choate, who will once again anchor the infield at first and second base. Their experience and leadership will be invaluable for a team that blends veteran presence with youthful talent.

The junior class brings plenty of athleticism back to the lineup with Ivanna Gutierrez returning to patrol center field, while Brylee Seiger rejoins the outfield after missing time and is expected to make an immediate impact.

Sophomore standouts Kenna Peach and KJ Pendergraft also return after impressive freshman campaigns. Peach will once again lead the pitching staff while serving as the Lady Eagles' leadoff hitter and seeing time at third base. Pendergraft is expected to log significant innings in right field while continuing to develop into an important contributor.

While the returning players provide stability, much of the excitement surrounds one of the strongest freshman classes Hennessey has seen in years.

Freshmen Reese Meek, Avery Weimer, Kinley Hladik, Lilah Keeton, Kambree Trotter, Hayden Hochstrasser, and Chloe Kelly have already begun making an immediate impact throughout preseason competition. The Lady Eagles also welcome transfer Isabella Butler and senior Valeria Villarreal Palacios.

The combination of seasoned upperclassmen and younger players who spent the summer competing in travel softball has created a competitive atmosphere throughout preseason practices.

Perhaps nowhere is that depth more evident than in the circle.

With Kenna Peach, Reese Meek, and Hayden Hochstrasser forming a three-pitcher rotation, Hennessey boasts a staff capable of attacking hitters in multiple ways through varying speeds, movement, and accuracy. That versatility gives the Lady Eagles confidence they can compete with anyone on their schedule.

Head Coach Jeneva "Coach J" believes the team's greatest strength extends beyond talent.

"This team is primarily young, and that's exciting for multiple different reasons. They are moldable, coachable, and have completely bought into the culture we're trying to create. Mixed with the great duo of seniors we have and the leadership they bring, I'm super excited for the regular season to start and see exactly what we're made of and the fight they'll bring."

Rather than easing into the season, Coach J intentionally built one of the toughest preseason schedules the program has faced.

"We mixed things up this summer and will continue to do so this preseason. We decided to face the top teams from each class and truly see where we line up and what we need to improve on. We're playing multiple teams that won state championships or made deep runs in the state tournament. These girls have the potential to be on that same stage. I want them to compete against the best and realize they're right there too."



The early results have been encouraging.

Through seven preseason contests, the Lady Eagles own a 4-2-1 record while outscoring opponents 31-7. Their pitching staff has been dominant, and the offense has consistently found ways to manufacture runs against quality competition.

The challenges aren't over yet.

Hennessey still has preseason matchups remaining against powerhouse programs including Washington, Piedmont, Dale, Lone Grove, and Westmoore—tests that should provide a clear picture of where the Lady Eagles stand heading into the regular season.

Regardless of the final preseason results, one thing is becoming increasingly clear: this is a program on the rise.

The Lady Eagles aren't simply hoping to have a good season—they're working to establish a new standard for Hennessey softball. Their commitment to hard work, accountability, and team-first culture is laying a foundation that future Lady Eagles can build upon for years to come.

If the early performances are any indication, this fall could mark the beginning of something special.

Be sure to come out and support the Lady Eagles this season. This is a team determined not only to win games, but to leave a lasting mark on Hennessey Softball and set the pace for every team that follows.
