HENNESSEY AND OTHERS CONTINUE TO DEAL WITH GRASS FIRES



Three Kingfisher County fire departments were called out Thursday evening, August 27, to battle another large grass fire.

At about 6 p.m., firefighters from Hennessey, Dover, and Loyal were dispatched to an area near the intersection of E 700 Road and N 2830 Road, southwest of Hennessey.

The smoky grass fire burned close to a tree line, but firefighters were able to contain the blaze before it could get out of hand.

N 2830 Road was temporarily closed while crews used the blacktop as a staging area for water tankers supplying the brush trucks. At one point, the Kingfisher County Sheriff's Office was called to assist with traffic control.

Kingfisher County Emergency Management was also on scene, assisting with coordination efforts.

Have you ever driven through Hennessey and thought, "Why don't we do something about that?"

Maybe you have an idea for improving the town. Maybe you have wondered how decisions are made, how projects get started or how taxpayer dollars are spent.

Instead of wondering from the sidelines, you could have a seat at the table.

Hennessey voters will elect town trustees in April 2027, and for residents who have ever considered getting more involved in their community, now is the time to learn what serving on the board is all about.

WHAT DOES A TRUSTEE ACTUALLY DO?

The Hennessey Board of Trustees helps make decisions that affect everyday life in town, including town services, finances, ordinances, improvements and future projects.

Trustees listen to residents, study issues, ask questions and vote on matters brought before the board.

You do not have to be a career politician to serve.

A board can benefit from people with different backgrounds and experiences, including business owners, parents, retirees, young adults and longtime residents. What matters is a willingness to learn, listen and work with others while making decisions for the community.

MORE THAN A CENTURY OF SERVICE

Hennessey residents have been stepping forward to serve on the town board since before Oklahoma became a state.

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Town trustee continued.

That is not a complete list. Town records and old newspapers likely hold many more names.

Different generations faced different challenges, but each person on that list had something in common: they agreed to take a seat at the table when their community needed people willing to serve.

The next generation of trustees will add new names to that history.

COULD YOUR NAME BE ONE OF THEM?

To run for trustee, a candidate must live within the Hennessey town limits and be a registered voter.

Oklahoma law also requires candidates for nonpartisan municipal office to have been registered voters at an address within the municipality for at least six months before filing a Declaration of Candidacy.

Anyone considering a run in 2027 should check their voter registration and make sure their address is correct well before filing begins.

THREE DAYS TO FILE

The next regular municipal election is scheduled for Tuesday, April 6, 2027.

Before voters head to the polls, candidates will have a short window to put their names on the ballot.

Candidate filing is scheduled for Monday, February 1 through Wednesday, February 3, 2027.

That is only three days.

Anyone seriously considering running should learn about the requirements and filing process ahead of time rather than waiting until February.

WHY STEP FORWARD?

Town government may not always grab the headlines, but its decisions can be some of the ones residents notice most.

Streets, utilities, town property, budgets, ordinances, improvements and long-term planning all involve decisions made at the local level.

Serving as a trustee means being willing to ask questions, hear different opinions and sometimes make difficult decisions.

Board members will not always agree, and they do not need to. Different perspectives can be valuable. What matters is being prepared, respectful and willing to put the needs of the community at the center of the discussion.

For more than a century, Hennessey residents have stepped forward when it was their turn to serve.

In 2027, someone else will have that opportunity.

Dustin Munroe Has Served Hennessey for More Than 20 Years

For Hennessey Fire Department Captain Dustin Munroe, being a firefighter is about something pretty simple, helping his community and being there when someone needs him.

Munroe, 44, is a Hennessey native and graduated from Hennessey High School in 2000. His regular day job is with Pioneer Telephone, but for more than two decades, he has also answered the call when the community needs the fire department.

Munroe joined the Hennessey Fire Department in August 2004. When asked why he became a firefighter, he wrote, "To help the community & be there for those in need."

Today, Munroe holds the rank of captain and has Firefighter I training. After more than 20 years in the fire service, he doesn't complicate the answer when asked about his favorite part of the job: putting fires out.

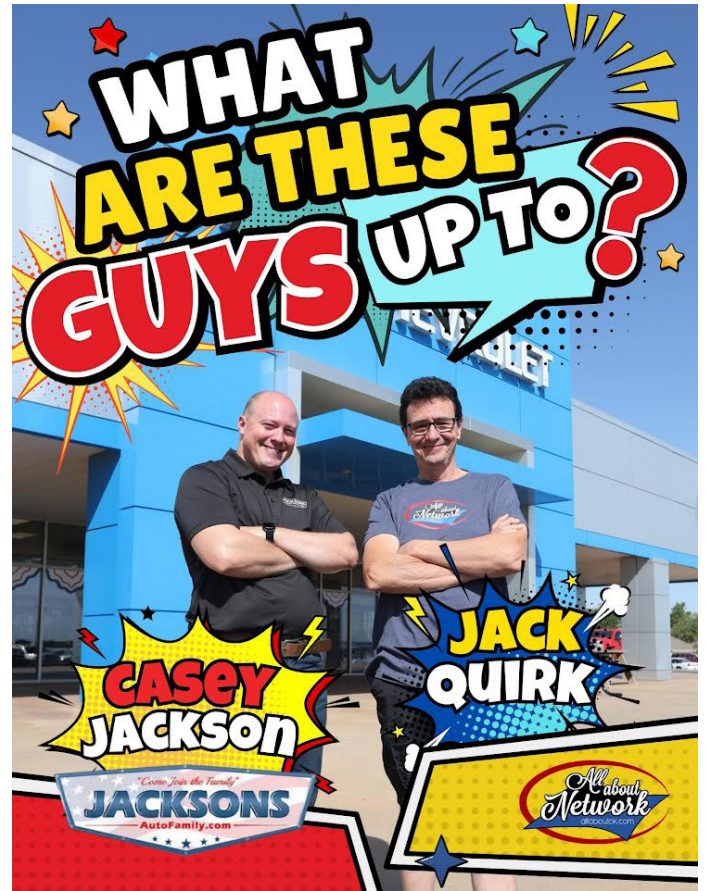
One fire in particular has stayed with him through the years. Munroe said his most memorable call was the large fire on Oct. 1, 2007, that destroyed three buildings on Hennessey's Main Street. It was the kind of major fire that remains etched in the memories of firefighters who were there.

Munroe has also reached an impressive milestone with the department. He noted that he is the third-longest-serving firefighter still active with the Hennessey Fire Department.

When he isn't working at Pioneer Telephone or responding to calls with the fire department, Munroe spends much of his spare time attending his daughters' sporting activities and doing yard work.

Volunteer firefighters like Munroe balance careers, families and everyday life with the responsibility of responding when their neighbors need help. For more than 20 years, Munroe has been one of those Hennessey residents willing to answer that call.

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SAYING GOODBYE TO THE LAST T-1 JAYHAWK AT VANCE

For retired Vance Air Force Base employee Mark Bruner, Friday morning, August 28, brought one more chance to say goodbye to an aircraft that had been a familiar part of his career.

Bruner retired from Vance AFB on December 31, 2025, but former co-workers and supervisors invited him back to sign the fuselage of the last T-1A Jayhawk to depart Vance.

Climbing onto the left wing, just as he had done countless times before, Bruner took a large black marker and left a message only his fellow T-1 maintainers could fully appreciate:

"No more FMS's- No more AMU 80%'s- No more broken knobs- See Ya!"

The message was a lighthearted reference to some of the routine maintenance tasks that came with keeping the T-1 flying. In a fitting bit of timing, the aircraft's AMU 80% light came on after engine start that morning. Bruner jokingly signaled to the pilots that he had already signed the aircraft, so they would have to take it as it was. The pilots smiled and waved as the roughly 20 people gathered for the departure laughed.

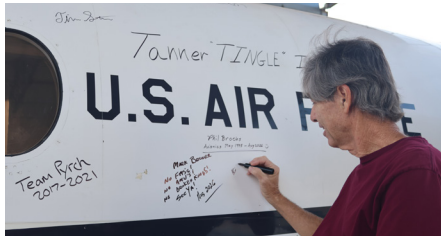
T-1s began flying at Vance in 1995. At its peak, the base had approximately 43 of the aircraft on its flight line. Vance was also once home to both the first and last T-1s produced, earning them the distinction of being the "Alpha and Omega" of the fleet.

On Friday, T-1A tail number 93-644 received its final sendoff. Chad Olsen, a 30-year T-1 mechanic and longtime co-worker and friend of Bruner, marshalled the aircraft out and gave it one final thumbs-up.

Maj. David Thomas and four other pilots then took the Jayhawk on its final journey from Vance to Davis-Monthan Air Force Base in Tucson, Arizona, home of the aircraft storage facility commonly known as "The Boneyard."

For decades, the T-1 Jayhawk helped train Air Force pilots preparing to fly airlift and tanker aircraft. With the Air Force transitioning to advanced simulator-based training, an era at Vance has now come to a close. For the people who spent years maintaining, flying and working around the T-1,

The weather might not be screaming "crockpot season" but we're busting ours out to keep from turning the oven on and to help us keep up with the already super packed back-to-school schedules!

This recipe is just a concoction we came up with combining some of our usual go-tos and

some ingredients we had on hand that needed to be used. Think hamburger helper (but with chicken) and make it taste more like chili con queso skillet. So good! And, as always, can be improved upon and modified by you to fit your preferences! For example: we've thought about adding a can or two of Rotel and a can of corn to make it more southwestern. Or maybe topping each bowl with sour cream when serving.

Crockpot Chicken Helper

Ingredients:

- 2 chicken breasts
- 2 cans cream of chicken soup
- 1 can chili
- ¼ block of velveeta
- Ranch seasoning*
- Taco seasoning*
- 16oz box macaroni noodles



We use bulk seasoning and measure to our hearts' content so we really struggle with giving you exact measurements. It's probably safe to assume it's about a packet's worth...?

Directions:

Cut up chicken breasts based on preference or cooking time ~ if you're trying to get this done quickly you'd need very small chunks to expedite the cooking time but if you plan to cook this low and slow your chicken chunks can be as big as you want, can even be cooked whole to shred after cooking.

While you're at the cutting board, go ahead and cut up the Velveeta into 1 inch chunks. (This probably isn't necessary but it makes us feel better to have it spread out and mixed in with all the other ingredients.)

Put chicken, Velveeta, cans of soup and chili into crock pot.

Season with Ranch and Taco seasoning.

Stir it all together. Apply lid. Cook on High for 2.5-3 hours or on Low for 6ish hours (stir occasionally if you're home)

Add entire box of macaroni noodles and 1-2 cups of water or chicken broth. Reapply lid and cook on High for 20-30 minutes or until noodles are al dente. Enjoy!

Inspired by rockabilly, tattoo culture, and the resurgence of traditional barbershops, Ward created a distinctive retro-style shop that has continued to grow. 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EAGLES DROP THE HOME OPENER 8/28/26

The 2026 Hennessey Eagles football season got off to a rocky start in the non-district home opener versus the Chisholm Longhorns, with a first-play, 62-yard touchdown pass from **Brayson Barnes** to TE **Jase Hennigh**.



Two possessions later, following a **Raiden Briley** fumble recovery, the Eagles answered back with a 4th and 1 QB sneak that Senior **Levi Ferrell** took 57 yards for the touchdown.

Unfortunately, this was as close as the Eagles could keep it, with the big play ability of the Longhorns capitalizing on touchdown runs of 69 and 5, and additional Barnes TD passes of 25 and 51 yards to put the game away with a final score of 35-6 Chisholm. Ferrell finished with 112 yards passing, going 16 of 35 with 2 interceptions, while leading all rushers with 23 carries for 122 yards and 1 touchdown.

Junior receiver **Beau Vinson** led the team with 54 yards on 7 catches, followed by **Brytan Gardner's** 6 receptions for 45 yards. The Longhorns only ran 26 plays from scrimmage (compared to the Eagles 56)- 14 went for 1st downs, while scoring 5 times. Gardner led the Eagles on defense with 6 total tackles and 1 forced fumble.

Junior WLB **Brayson Brinson** showed out as well, with 3 solos and 1 assist, 2 tackles for loss, and 1 forced fumble.

Mike Linebacker **Jameson Ladwig** added 4 solos with 1 tackle for loss, and Vinson pulled down 3 tackles, 2 pass breakups, and 1 TFL.

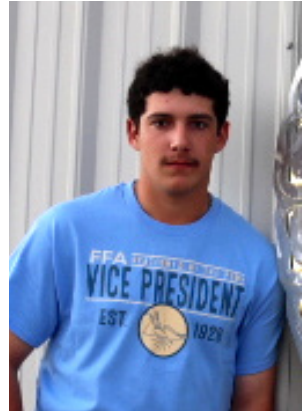

THE OTHER SIDE OF THE STORY

In the first half of this story, last week, I shared the journey of my friend Cindy Cochran of Okarche, a journey that began when she was just 17 years old.

In 1981, Cindy found herself pregnant and living at the Deaconess Home for unwed mothers. She made a decision that would stay with her for the rest of her life: to place her baby girl for adoption. It was an act of sacrificial love.

Cindy crocheted a pair of booties for her baby and wrote her a letter, hoping that somehow, someday, her daughter might read it. Then came the day Cindy signed the adoption papers and said goodbye.

For the next 45 years, she prayed.

Cindy went on to raise four children and became a grandmother, building a life filled with family and love. But there was always one piece of her heart she carried with her. Cindy knew her baby as "Tuesday."

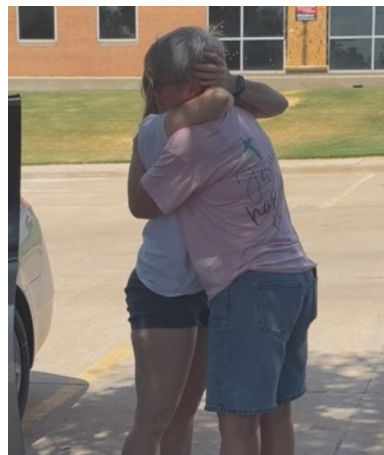
Her adoptive parents, Rev. Roy and Paula Duff, knew her as Julie Duff.

Then, in 2026, DNA and Ancestry helped Cindy's family find the match they had hoped for. After conversations, questions, tears and 45 years apart, Cindy and Julie finally agreed to meet.

And they chose a fitting place to do it: the parking lot where their story had begun all those years ago.

But Cindy's story is only one half of this journey.

There was a little girl on the other side of that adoption who grew up, built a life of her own and eventually discovered there was much more to the story of where she came from. When I asked Julie if she would allow me to share this story,



I also asked her to tell me what she wanted people to know about her journey.

She sent me a letter.

After reading it, I knew I shouldn't try to retell it for her. Some stories need to be heard in the voice of the person who lived them. So this time, I'm stepping aside.

This is Julie's story, in her own words.

I have always known I was adopted. I can't think of a time I didn't know. There were many times when I would go to the doctor and they would ask about my medical history. Or I would hear other kids getting told they look like their mother or father. I never knew my medical history or who I looked like.

However, my adopted parents raised me with the belief that I had 2 sets of parents who loved me. One set who loved me enough to give me a better chance at life and another set who gave me the better chance at life. Even with all the love in the world, something was missing. I needed to know where I came from. I wanted to know who I looked like.

There were times in life that I started the process of looking for my biological mother, but something always stopped the progression. Whether it was finances or just me not being where I wanted to be in life, I would stop.

I went thru my trials and tribulations in life. I believed the time would come and I needed to be ready. The past 5 years I have really worked on getting back on the right path in life. I had to re-learn to love myself after some of the things I had gone thru.

Within the past year and a half I knew I was ready. My daughters are in great places now and so am I. I am in a loving relationship, have an amazing job, and I'm just exactly where I need to be. Everything has been falling into place for me.

A few months ago, my middle daughter had done Ancestry.Com. I loved hearing of her results so I decided to do mine. On July 22, 2026 at 3am, my notification went off on my phone that my results had come in. I didn't expect anything except to figure out my heritage.

Then I noticed a part that said 'DNA matches'. I clicked on it and saw a match that said 'Mother'! I was baffled! Was I looking at that correctly?!? I saw her picture and she has my face! I hadn't wept that hard in years! I instantly wrote to her. I said something along the lines of, 'I am sorry is this sounds weird, but I was adopted out of Oklahoma City and my biological mother named me Tuesday. I matched with you on Ancestry. Is that you by chance?'

I wept some more then went to sleep. I woke up to a message back that said, 'I believe you are my Tuesday!' I found my birth mother!! I have siblings! All of a sudden, my world felt complete.

The way we seamlessly communicated was so incredible! We set a date and I traveled to meet her and my siblings. I took my fiance and my 3 daughters with me. We talked for hours as if we'd known each other for life! We had, but we were still complete strangers.

Their family was so inviting! I have a letter that she wrote me when I was born and I wrote her a letter to give when I met her. The strength it took for her at such a young age to make the selfless decision to give me life and love is mind-blowing. And the ability for us to reconnect the way we did...

That's God! All of this has been in God's hands and in His timing. My adopted parents raised me with endless unconditional love and I am forever in debt to them. They chose life and love for me just like my birth mother chose love and life for me. My heart is so full! I am with my perfect partner, my daughters so perfect, and my life is so complete!

And Cindy found her Tuesday!

KINGFISHER COUNTY APPROVES 50/50 GRANT FOR NEW TORNADO SIRENS

Kingfisher County Commissioners approved participation in a 50/50 grant program for new solar-powered outdoor warning sirens during their Monday, August 31 meeting.

Proposed locations include south of Hennessey near the Lightle Sand Operation and northwest of Cashion, expanding outdoor emergency warning coverage in rural areas of Kingfisher County.

Each siren is estimated to cost approximately \$35,000, with half covered by grant funding and half by local funds. That puts the local share at approximately \$17,500 per siren.

Because the sirens are solar powered, electrical service will not have to be extended to the locations, making installation more practical in rural areas.

The commissioners approved moving forward with the grant, although the county's final budget for the project has not yet been finalized.
