VEHICLE FIRE SPREADS TO FIELD NEAR HIGHWAY 132



Hennessey and Dover firefighters responded to a vehicle fire involving an agricultural spray rig around noon Wednesday, September 16, near the intersection of E600 Road and Highway 132.

The location is approximately one mile south of the Kingfisher-Garfield County line.

The fire began on the spray rig and spread into a nearby field, creating an additional concern with the extremely dry conditions across the area. Firefighters were able to quickly extinguish the field fire before it could spread farther.

The Oklahoma Highway Patrol closed the northbound lane of Highway 132 for approximately an hour while firefighters and other emergency personnel worked at the scene.

No injuries were reported.

The incident was one of several recent fires local departments have responded to as drought conditions have left grass and vegetation exceptionally dry across Kingfisher County. HENNESSEY WINE FESTIVAL RETURNS TO MEMORIAL PARK OCTOBER 3

Hennessey will welcome visitors from across Oklahoma on **Saturday, October 3**, for the 2026 Hennessey Wine Festival, bringing an afternoon of Oklahoma wines, food, shopping and fall fun to Memorial Park.

The festival will run from noon to 6 p.m. and will feature 10 Oklahoma wineries, food and specialty vendors, plus 18 additional vendors offering a variety of items.

Hennessey will be well represented in this year's winery lineup with three local wineries participating: Vernost Wine Co., Turn-er Me On Wines and Stubborn Bill.

Joining the Hennessey wineries will be Twisted and Tangled of Shidler, Backyard Winery of Oklahoma City, Shakespeare Winery of Chickasha, Wild Horse Canyon of Luther, Quartz Mountain of Altus, Native Spirits Winery of Norman and Put a Cork in It of Oklahoma City.

It won't be all about the wine, either.

Several non-wine vendors will be joining the festivities, including MK Concessions of Cleo Springs, 40 Martyrs of Enid and SOB Stoppers of Enid, with more expected.

Shoppers will also have plenty to browse throughout the afternoon, with 18 vendors of all kinds scheduled to participate. It makes the festival an easy excuse to spend a fall Saturday outdoors, visit with friends, do a little shopping, grab something to eat and enjoy Hennessey.

Wine-tasting wristbands are \$20. Anyone wishing to participate in wine tasting must be 21 or older and present a valid photo ID.

With wineries traveling from communities across the state and three hometown wineries taking part, the Hennessey Wine Festival is a chance to sample what Oklahoma wineries have to offer while supporting local and Oklahoma businesses.

The 2026 Hennessey Wine Festival will be held Saturday, October 3, from noon to 6 p.m. at Memorial Park in Hennessey.

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COUNTY FIREFIGHTERS WORK ANOTHER LARGE FIRE AS EXCEPTIONAL DROUGHT GRIPS AREA

Firefighters from several departments worked together Tuesday night to battle another large brush fire near the Cimarron River as extreme drought continues to create dangerous fire conditions across the area.

The fire was first reported at about 8 p.m. Tuesday, September 15, near the intersection of N2710 Road and Highway 51 in far western Kingfisher County. Firefighters worked for several hours before containing the fire to the north side of the highway along the Cimarron River by approximately 11 p.m.

Fire departments responding included Loyal, Hennessey, Ames, Dover, Drummond and Pioneer. Kingfisher County District 2 also assisted with two graders and a dozer, while the Kingfisher County Sheriff's Office provided traffic control.

No structures were reported damaged, and no injuries were reported.

The fire comes as Kingfisher County continues to deal with extremely dry conditions. According to U.S. Drought Monitor data released September 17 and valid through September 15, the Kingfisher area was experiencing exceptional drought, or D4, the highest category on the Drought Monitor scale.

Conditions are serious across Oklahoma as well. Approximately 86 percent of the state was experiencing severe drought or worse as of September 15, including areas of severe, extreme and exceptional drought.

The drought developed rapidly during a brutally hot and dry August. According to the Oklahoma Mesonet, August 2026 was Oklahoma's third-warmest and fifth-driest August since statewide records began in 1895. The state received an average of only 0.85 inches of precipitation during the month, 2.38 inches below normal.

BURN BAN EXTENDED THROUGH OCTOBER 5

With dry conditions and fire danger continuing, **Kingfisher County Commissioners extended the countywide burn ban beginning September 21 through October 5.**

LADY EAGLES GIVING HENNESSEY PLENTY TO CHEER ABOUT



If you have not made it out to watch the Hennessey Lady Eagles play softball this fall, you might want to change that.

The Lady Eagles are putting together an impressive 2026 season, and their recent championship run at the Sayre Lady Eagle Classic is just the latest reason for Hennessey fans to take notice.

Through 26 games, Hennessey has compiled a 17-6 record while combining strong pitching with an offense capable of producing runs throughout the lineup. The Lady Eagles have scored 165 runs this season while batting .317 as a team.

And now, they have some new hardware to show for it.

Hennessey battled through three days of softball Thursday, Friday and Saturday at the Sayre Lady Eagle Classic before emerging as tournament champions.

The Lady Eagles capped off the tournament with a 5-0 victory over Sayre in the championship game, and sophomore **Kenna Peach** delivered one of the standout performances of the season.

Peach threw six no-hit innings, striking out 11 and walking only two as Hennessey shut out the host Lady Eagles.

It was another big outing in what has already been an outstanding season in the circle for Peach. Through the team's first 26 games, she has pitched 94⅓ innings, recorded 120 strikeouts and posted a 1.19 ERA. Peach has also contributed offensively, batting .357 with 25 hits and 24 runs scored.

But this season has been far from a one-player show.

Avery Weimer has been tremendous at the plate. Through 23 games, Weimer is batting a team-leading .539 with 41 hits, including five doubles, four triples and a home run. She has driven in 16 runs and scored 25.

Ivana Gutierrez is batting .388 with 19 hits and 13 RBIs, while **Brylee Seiger** is hitting .364 with 24 hits, six doubles and 13 RBIs.

Kinley Hladik has also been a major part of the Lady Eagles' offense. She is batting .354 with 23 hits and leads the team with 27 runs scored and 19 RBIs.

Reese Meek has provided extra-base power with seven doubles,

two triples and a home run while batting .316. She has driven in 12 runs and scored 19.

That production up and down the lineup has helped make Hennessey a difficult team to put away. The Lady Eagles have collected 186 hits, including 31 doubles and six triples, and have driven in 115 runs as a team. They have also shown patience at the plate, drawing 76 walks.

In the circle, Hennessey's pitching staff has combined for a 1.66 ERA through 143⅓ innings, allowing only 34 earned runs. Peach and Meek have handled the bulk of those innings, giving Hennessey two options in the circle as the season moves toward its most important stretch. And there is still softball left to play.

The tournament championship in Sayre adds another memorable chapter to a season that has given Hennessey fans plenty to cheer about, but the Lady Eagles are not finished.

For anyone who has been meaning to catch a game but has not made it yet, this would be a good time.

Statistics only tell part of the story. There is something different about watching a team put it all together in person, from a big strikeout in the circle to a hard-hit ball finding the gap and teammates waiting at home plate after a run.

The Lady Eagles have given Hennessey plenty of those moments already this fall.

They are winning games, putting runs on the board, getting strong pitching and bringing home championships.

Now they just need some hometown fans in the stands to enjoy the ride with them.

BUILDING A PLACE TO REMEMBER - WOODRING HONOR WALL & VETERANS PARK

In a recent episode of The All About Show, we sat down with Elaine Johns, founder and director of the Woodring Wall of Honor & Veterans Park, to talk about her Hennessey roots, career in aviation, and decades-long mission to preserve the stories of America's veterans.

Originally born in Edinburgh, Scotland, Johns came to Hennessey as a teenager to live with her grandparents. She graduated from Hennessey, married Eddie Johns, and eventually began working as a temporary secretary at Northwest Aeroservices. Within 10 years, she worked her way up to general manager and ultimately purchased the company.

Aviation also gave Johns opportunities to serve others, including Angel Flight missions and flying crisis counselors to New York following the September 11 attacks. Over time, those experiences and the military history surrounding Woodring Airport inspired an even bigger undertaking.

What began as an idea for a few granite stones honoring veterans grew into Woodring Veterans Park. The park was dedicated in 2000 before a crowd of more than 1,500 people and continued expanding in the years that followed.

One of its most recognizable additions came later when Johns helped lead the effort to permanently acquire and install a Vietnam Memorial Wall. The approximately \$1 million project ultimately became Oklahoma's official Vietnam War monument.

Today, the mission has grown far beyond the original park. A military museum inside the former Sears building at Oakwood Mall contains artifacts, aircraft, military vehicles, replicas, simulators, and exhibits spanning from the Civil War through the modern War on Terror. Remarkably, the organization remains entirely volunteer operated.

For Johns, what began as a way to say "thank you" has become a decades-long effort to ensure the stories, sacrifices, and history of veterans are not forgotten. You can watch the full episode on AllAboutHennessey.com

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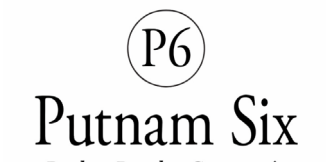
